With Rod and Gun

Hordes of sea lampreys, parasitic scourge of the commercial and game fisheries of the Great Lakes, are now at the peak of their annual spawning run.

Special weirs, or traps, are now being operated by the Department at eight strategic points in known spawnings streams to capture lampreys and destroy them before they can lay their eggs

Operations are centred this year around Lake Huron rivers such as Saugeen, Nine Mile, Sauble, Beaver, Maitland and also the Thessalon and Bridgland rivers and Milford Haven creek which empty into the North Channel

the capture and destruction of 16,500 lampreys. The importance of nil this catch is manified, fisheries biologists point out, when consideration is given to the fact that one female lamprey is capable of laying

236,000 eggs. Lampreys started their spawning migration this year on April 28th in the Saugeen River and the run in the various streams is expected to continue until the end of May As many as 929 of the parasites have been taken in one day by weir operators on the Saugeen.

Methods of trapping the eel like creatures have been under constant experiment and the Department now has standardized, methods developed for catching them.

perpendicular wooden walls 28" wide and 18" apart fastened to up- a 7 lb pike caught by Maurice rights which are in turn attached. to logs anchored to the stream bed. These walls serve as dams and the water is forced through the narrow openings between them. Opposite each opening a cylindrical trap is placed.

The lampreys, in aftempting to negotiate the strong current racing through the harrow openings are washed into traps, and are unable, due to the funnel shaped opening.

Operators, stationed at the weirs, can reach the traps, to empty them of their catch periodically by a catwalk placed across the structures.

The sea lamprey, which is a pseudo fish, closely resembling an eel, feeds on fish by fastening. itself by means of its round disklike mouth to its prey where it remains

until it drains all, or nearly all, the lifeblood from its victim.

Department men are at constant war with the creature trying to discover new ways to hasten its destruction for, they say, its existence in numbers constitutes a potential threat to the important commercial fisheries, especially the lake trout and white fish of the Great Lakes.

. Those who have studied the creature's life cycle and history believe that the lampfey gained access to the upper lakes with the opening of the Welland Canal. However, its presence: was not discovered, in Lake Erie until 92 years after the canal was opened when an adult specimen was captured and identifield on Nov. 8, 1921. Before the canal was completed the lamprey had been unable to get past Lake Ontario, into Lake Erie because of the formidable barrier of Niagara

Within thirty years after the first specimen was taken in Lake Erie the sea lamprey had spread rapidly throughout Lake Erie, Lakes Huron and Michigan, in that order. By 1945 it had made its way into the largest body of fresh water in the world - Lake Superior.

If its spawning run is not thwarted by a trap the adult lamprey seeks out clear water over riffles in a stream bed. It moves stones on the bottom until it has a round silt-free depression made in the sand. Here it deposits the thousands of eggs.

After their task has been completed both the male and female probably die but the potenial crop they leave behind makes their demise of little consequence. One month after the eggs have been laid countless thousands of young parasites hatch out to continue once they mature, the destructive work of their predecessors. .

It is because of their great reproductive ability that the Dept. concentrates on capturing the lampreys as they go into streams and spawn. Rivers, and creeks feeding into the Great Lakes chain are constantly being watched by field officers for signs of Lamprey activity
