Georgetown Soldier Dies Fighting in Korean War

Cpl. Ron Edmunds Killed in Action with Canada's Special Force in Korea

The Korean war was brought much closer to home when the sad news came early last Wednesday evening of the death in action of Cpl. Ronald Lawrence Edmunds, 20-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Edmunds, R. R. 1, Georgetown.

The news was conveyed to his parents by telegram from Ottawa and as yet no details have been received other than the official wording of the army despatch. Cpl. Edmunds sailed for Korea with the 2nd Battalion from Canada in mid-April to join the Canadian Special Force serving with United Nations troops against the North Korean and Chinese Communists.

The news came as a great shock to his family who had only that day received a letter from him written on May 12th. That afternoon, Mrs. Edmunds had mailed parcels to her two soldier sons.

Cpl. Edmunds was born in Toronto and later lived in Weston, attending Weston Collegiate. He was a member of the United Church. At time of his enlistment he was employed with Cedarvale Tree, Experts.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George R. Edmunds, two brothers, Allan and David and five sisters, Mrs. Wilfred Aytton (Verna), Burnhamthorpe, Mrs. Dorian Brown, (Aileen), Toronto, Mrs. "Red" Haugbie (Noreen) and Mrs. Moses Taggart (Patricia), Weston and Mrs. Jean Powell, wife of Sgt. Ernie Powell, Camp Borden.

Ron enlisted with his older brother, Allan, last August when Canada called for volunteers for the special force made necessary by Communist defiance of a United Nations cease-fire order in Korea. Allan was already a veteran of overseas service with the RCME in World War 2 and was working at Smith and Stone at the time of his enlistment. The brothers trained at Petawawa and Fort Lewis, Washington, with the Royal Canadian Regiment.

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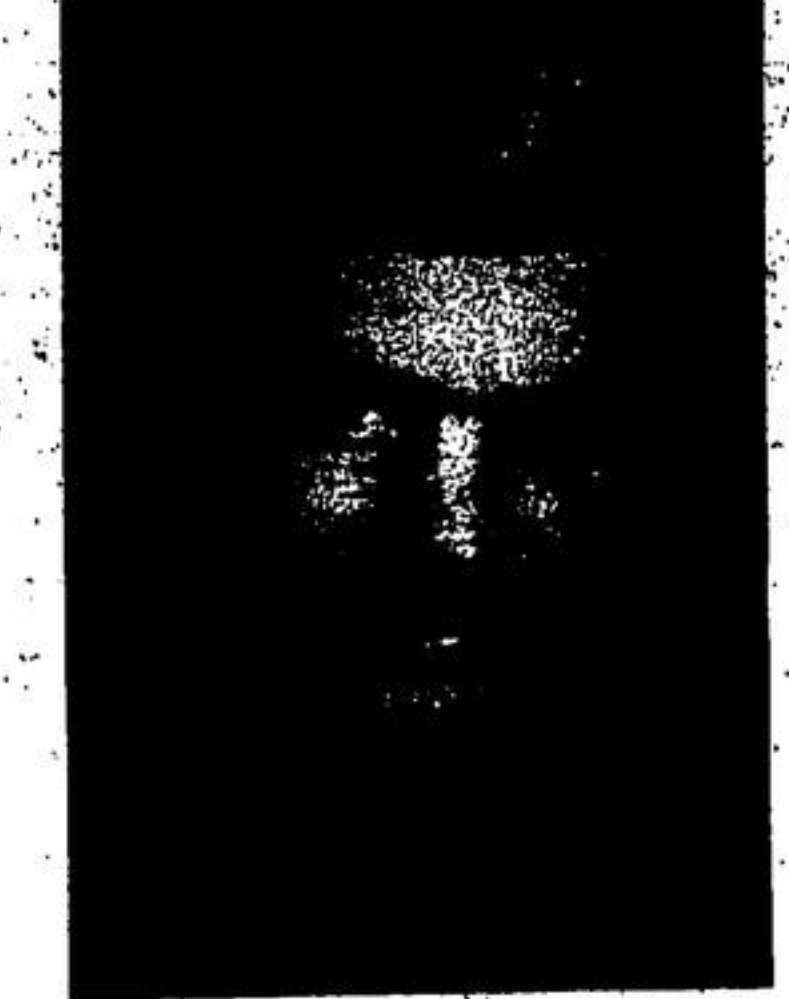
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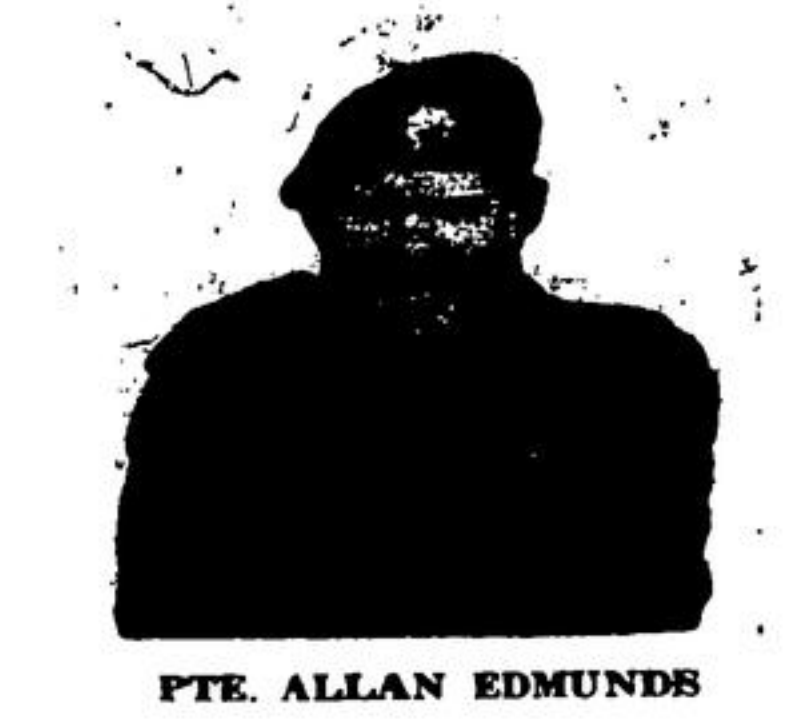
