Two in Hospital, Damages of \$1300 in Week-End Accidents

Two people were hospitalized, and damages amounted to \$1300 in three accidents which occurred during the week.

Last Wednesday, Alexander Dolson, R. R. 2, Norval, was taken to Guelph General Hospital with back injuries following a traffic accident at the corner of Victoria Road and Grange Road, Guelph. He was hurt when a car, driven by Donald Dolson, was in collision with a bread truck driven by Merlin Salter, Galt. The car crashed at the intersection. Mr. Dolson's car was damaged to the extent of about \$500 and the truck received \$50 damage.

Miss Muriel McLelland, Hamilton, suffered severe cuts and bruises to the face and a possible fractured nose and cheekbone, and Miss Emily Mann, Hamilton, suffered a broken wrist Sunday morning, when the automobile in which they were passengers failed to make the turn into Glen Williams and struck the steel girders of the bridge spanning the river. New Organ Dedicated Presbyterian Church

A special service of dedication of a new pipe organ was held in Knox Presbyterian Church on Sunday morning. The church, beautifully decorated with flowers, was filled by the congregation for this happy occasion.

The service of dedication was conducted by the minister, Rev. Alex J. Calder, assisted by the session clerk, Mr. Alex Hume, who read the scripture lesson.

In his sermon, Mr. Calder traced the history and meaning of instrumental music in the church. Miss Marion Heppburn, A.R.C.T. who had led the opening service of praise with piano accompaniment, led the choir and congregation with the organ, immediately after the dedication, in "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow." The choir sang two anthems, "God So Loved the World" and "How Lovely Are Thy Dwellings."

The guest soloist for the service was Mrs. G. L. Royal, wife of the new Presbyterian minister at Norval, who sang "The Stranger of Galilee" and "My Task." Miss Heppburn played "Pastorale" by Leysbach as the offertory and "Postlude" by Harris as the postlude.

The Presbyterian Church was first organized in Georgetown by Dr. Burns in 1860 and a brick church was built on the present site in 1867. When a reed organ, still in the basement of the church, was first placed in the building, there were objections raised because there were those at that time who thought that organ music detracted from church worship.

The present stone building was erected in 1888 and a one-manual pipe organ was installed by the ladies of the congregation. In 1901, a fire which started under the organ completely destroyed it, along with a large part of the church building. The church was rebuilt and a two-manual organ installed in 1902. At the beginning of this year, the congregation decided that another organ was necessary and the present one was purchased.

CAL CLARK MANAGER OF WANSTEAD CO-OP

Calvin Clark has been named manager of a cooperative in Wanstead and begins his new position there this week-end.

Mr. Clark has been associated with Frank Whitmee in Clark and Whitmee Electric for the past two years. The two men have been dealers in electrical products and DeLaval farm equipment, as well as doing electrical wiring. Mr. Whitmee will continue this business under his own name.

The Wanstead Farmers Co-Operative Co. Ltd. is affiliated with the United Farmers Co-op. A seven-man staff operates two feed mills and carries on a briar business in such supplies as feed, fertilizer, seed and coal. Wanstead is located just off No. 7 Highway near Wyoming in the Sarnia district, nine miles from Petrolia.

Mrs. Clark, with their children Beverley and Donald, will stay in town until the end of the school term, when they will leave for their new home in Wanstead.

Mr. Clark, who is a native of Eden Mills, has been a resident of town since 1939 when he purchased the feed mill on the highway which has just been purchased by the Milton District Co-Op from Del Maltby. He worked in Guelph for the Guelph Stove Company during the early war years, then returned to town and operated the feed mill again. A few years ago he established an electrical store in Main Street in the premises now tenanted by Simpson's Order Office. He later sold this business to Jesse Wardlaw, and built a store and apartment on the highway, now operated as Kay's Grocery by Kay Bludd.
