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Dodge-DeSoto Dealer David Saxe Dies

A prominent Georgetown businessman, David Saxe died suddenly at Toronto Western Hospital early Friday afternoon. Mr. Saxe, who had suffered from a heart condition for some time, had been in ill health the past few months and had been unable to be at work. He was rushed to hospital after suffering a severe heart attack Friday morning and died soon after admittance to hospital.

The elder son of Mr. Morris Saxe and the late Mrs. Saxe, he was born 36 years ago in Acton. The family moved to Georgetown when he was a child and he attended public and high schools here. In 1939, he purchased the garage business of Sid Mills on the highway and since that time had been Dodge and DeSoto dealer in Georgetown. He was also associated with his father in operating the Georgetown Creamery and Locker Storage, which is located in the same building as the garage.

Mr. Saxe was one of Georgetown's most popular citizens. He was a former president of Georgetown Hockey Club and was one of the team's most enthusiastic supporters. He was a member of Orion Lodge, IOOF.

Surviving are his wife, Ellen Curtis, whom he married eight years ago, two children, Stephen and Catharine, and his father, Morris Saxe. Also surviving are three sisters and one brother, Mrs. Mac Fichman (Mina), New York City, Mrs. Sam Ginsburg (Pearl), Mus-

Two local young men have successfully passed their exams at the University of Toronto.

Both boys are graduates of Georgetown High School.

Tragic news was received by his parents on Monday afternoon of the death in a flying accident in England of Flight Lieutenant Gordon Alexander McDonald.

A Meteor jet plane which he was piloting in training manoeuvres crashed shortly after taking off from the air field at Biggin Hill. A few moments later, two other jet pilots were killed when their planes collided over the field.

Winston Churchill visited the field earlier but left before the accidents. It was the opening day of reserve training for Squadron No. 615 of which he is honorary commander.

News of the young pilot's death was communicated in a cablegram to his parents early Monday afternoon. On Tuesday morning, his wife phoned her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Nielsen, saying that she intended to sail for Canada as soon as boat passage is arranged.

The elder son of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin McDonald, Queen Street, Flt. Lieut. McDonald was born 28 years ago when his parents lived on a farm in the Scotch Block. He attended Waterloo Public School and Georgetown High School. His family moved to Georgetown in 1943.

He was working at the Dominion Seed House when he enlisted in the RCAF in 1941. In January, 1942, he was commissioned, one of the youngest men ever to win an air force commission. After serving as an instructor at Camp Borden, he went overseas in December, 1942, served in England and Scotland, and was then transferred to India, where he was attached to the Royal Air Force until the end of the war.

After the war, he was employed at Smith & Stone Ltd., and in the spring of 1947 he rejoined the air force, being granted his discharge rank of Flight Lieutenant. He was in England for a year, then spent two years at Aldergrove, North Island, before his transfer back to England last November, to the RAF station at Linton-on-Ouse.

Flt. Lieut. McDonald's career as an air force officer had been brilliant. In his advanced training class, he won the coveted Clarkson trophy for aerobatics, the first Canadian to gain this honour in many years. His age precluded him from a further rise in rank, up till the present, but he was due to write his examinations for a senior commission later this year.

He is survived by his wife, the former Lois Nielsen of town, whom he married before going to England in 1947, and who followed him overseas shortly after. They have one son, Ronald Alan, age two and a half. Also surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alvin McDonald, the former Helen Lindsay, a sister, Marjorie, Mrs. Jack Tarrwell, whose husband is with the RCAF at Trenton, and a younger brother, James, a student at Georgetown High School. His father is a veteran of two wars, having served with the artillery overseas in the first war, and with the Veterans Guards of Canada from 1940 to 1947.

Prominent Banker Dies Started Career Here

A banker who started as a junior in the old Bank of Hamilton here many years ago, and rose to be manager-in-chief of Hamilton branches of the Bank of Commerce, died in St. Joseph's Hospital, Hamilton, on Saturday.

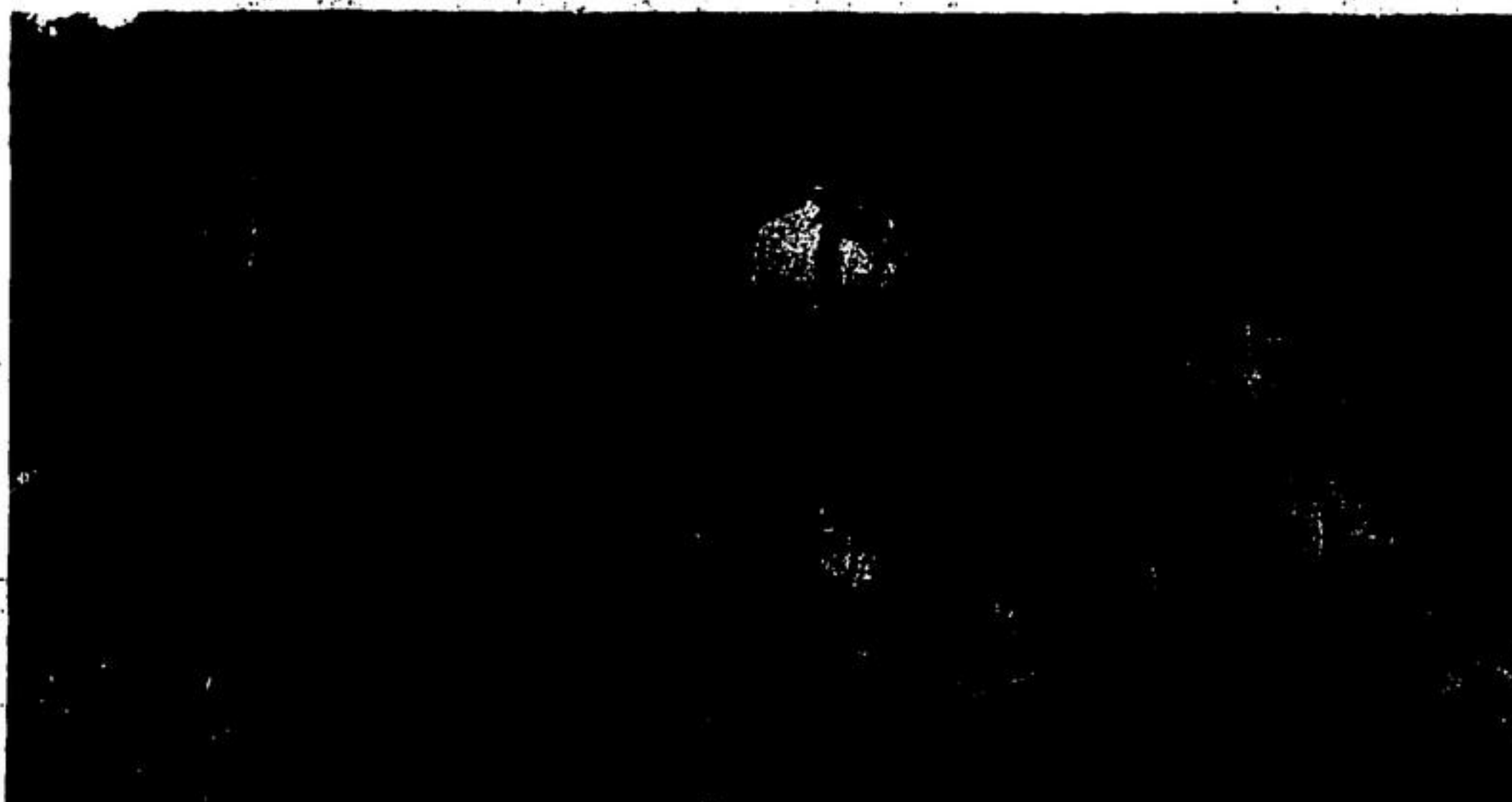
He was John Percival Bell, born in Hamilton 79 years ago, he was general manager of the Bank of Hamilton at the time of its amalgamation. He retired in 1935.

Mr. Bell was prominent in the Church of England, a warden of Christ Church Cathedral, and long-time lay delegate to the Synod of Niagara. He was also honorary treasurer of the General Synod of the Church of England in Canada.

Mr. Bell's business career began as a junior clerk in Georgetown in 1888. He served at Kitchener and opened the bank's first branch in Brantford before returning to Hamilton as local manager in 1909.

He is survived by two sons, John T. and Alan S.; three daughters, Mrs. H. F. Lazier, Mrs. Hugh Robertson and Lady Aylmer, Montreal; and one sister, Miss Madeline Bell.
