Seek Baseball Win Tonight from Acton

Georgetown's intermediate ball team, while they have not been hitting the winning trail, are still giving a good account of themselves in the county league. The team is host to Acton tonight at the local park, and will be in there trying for their second win of the season. So far they have defeated Clarkson once and tied them.

Their last meeting with Acton ended with the Tanners winning a hard-fought 10-9 victory. Last Tuesday, there was a disappointment when Milton cancelled a scheduled appearance here and there was not enough time to advise fans that the game was postponed. The seventeen local men in uniform put on a practice game free that night.

Friday the team played their first game under floodlights at Oakville, and gave the Oaks one of the best games yet. In six innings of play Georgetown led 1-0, behind a good performance on the mound by Harvey Chappell. Harv struck out eleven men in these innings. He was spiked in the sixth, and relief pitcher Glenn Gibbs, while he pitched good ball, could not stem the tide and Oakville won 4-1.

Doctors and Dentists Dine at Brant Inn

A very successful joint dinner meeting of The Halton County Medical and Dental Societies was held at the Brant Inn, Burlington, on Wednesday, June 6th. This is an annual event. Similar meetings have been held for the past 3 years. There were twenty-nine members and guests present.

The speaker of the evening was Dr. A. D. Kelly, Assistant Secretary, Canadian Medical Association. Dr. Kelly was introduced by Dr. James M. Mather and thanked by Dr. J. W. MacFarlane, of Burlington for the Medical Society, and Dr. J. G. McFarlane of Burlington for the Dental Society.

Dr. Kelly has recently returned from GREAT BRITAIN where, through the cooperation of the British Medical Association, he made an intensive study of Health Services now in effect under the National Health Act. Dr. Kelly emphasized that it is merely coincidental that socialized medicine was introduced under a Labour Government. Its origins go back to at least 1911 and the Beveridge Report which was the basis for the present organization antedated the assumption of power by the Labour party. The service, with minor exceptions, is extremely popular among the people. In the speaker's personal opinion, the quality of service given by physicians and dentists has deteriorated because of the tremendous demands made upon them. The cost of the service has been very high.

A long discussion and question period was good evidence of the great interest of the physicians and dentists present.
