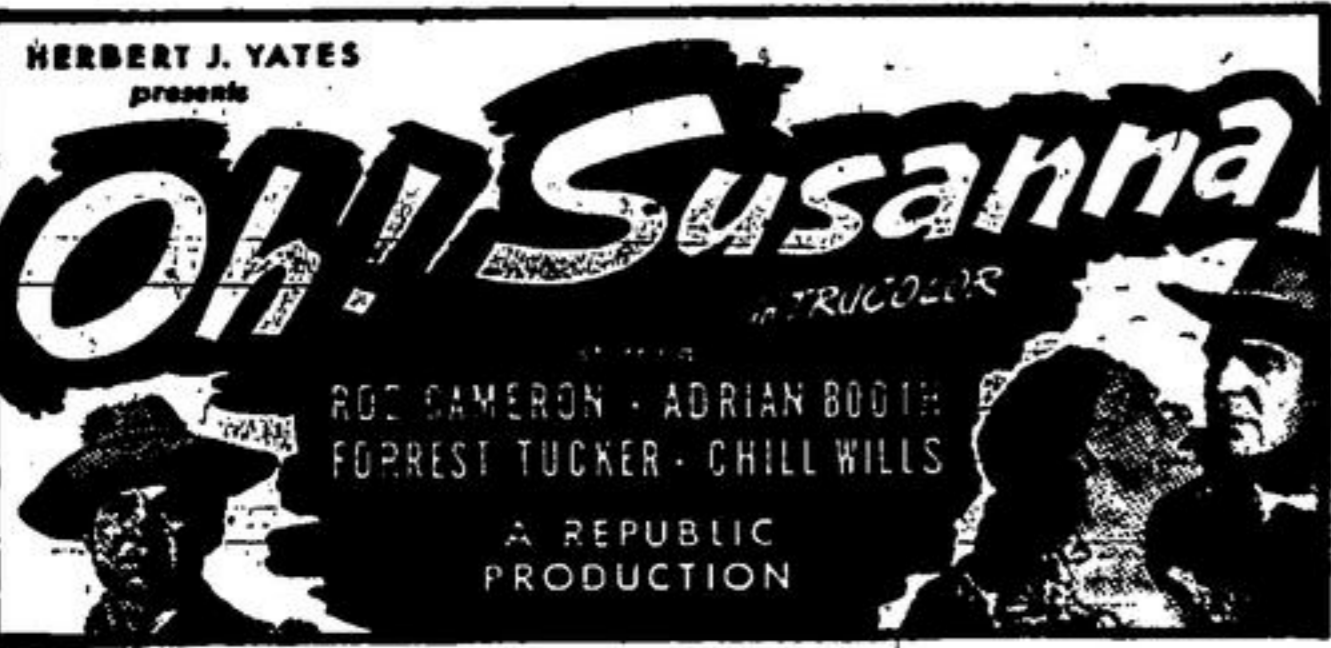

NORVAL New Norval Minister World War 2 Veteran

Rev. G. Lockhart Royal, new Presbyterian minister of Norval and Union churches is a native of Collingwood, but has lived in several cities and towns, among them Barrie, Winnipeg, London, Midland and Toronto.

Mr. Royal obtained his schooling in Winnipeg and Toronto. He joined the army after graduating from high school and was commissioned a lieutenant in the Royal Canadian Artillery, serving on instructional staffs at Aldershot and RCAF Camp. After the war he attended the University of Toronto, and then studied for the ministry at Knox College, from which he graduated this spring. He spent one summer in the mission field at Sussex, N.B., and was a student pastor for two summers at Guthrie, Ontario.

Mr. Royal was called by the Norval and Union congregations last month to replace Rev. J. Leonard Self, who went to Midland at the start of the year. He is a member of Beaver Masonic Lodge, Thornbury, and has been active in boy scout work, holding a scoutmaster's certificate. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. George A.
