**Dr. Paul Beer
Buys Two Heifers
At Henry Sale**

After close to half a century of
operation, the purebred Holstein
herd of Geo. S. Henry, former On-
tario Premier, was dispersed at
Tadmorden on June 25th. The 105
head sold brought \$64,940 for a
general average of \$618. Despite
the good haying weather a crowd
of over 500 buyers was on hand.
Top price of \$5,000 was paid by
the Maple Cattle Breeders' Associa-
tion, Maple, for the five-year-old
heifer, Rembo Texal Sovereign.
The runner-up was the Toronto
District Holstein Breeders' Club
also of Maple. This bull was Re-
serve All-Canadian three-year-old
for 1949 is a son of the noted "So-
vereign" out of Lonelm Texal Joan
one of the best daughters of Lonelm
Texal Fayne on whose blood the
artificial breeding program of the
Maple Cattle Breeders' Association
has been largely built. Joan was
twice Grand Champion at the Mid-
dlesex County Black and White
Show and has records up to 836
lbs. fat.

A total of 46 progeny of the
Rembo bull, ranging from baby
calves to first calf heifers brought
an average of \$503. Auctioneer L.
E. Franklin stated that this was
the largest number of progeny
from one bull that he had ever
sold in a single sale. The highest
price for one of his daughters was
\$1,900 paid by T. Cleland, repre-
senting Brown Corporation, La
Tuque, Que., who bought the bred
heifer Oriole Lodge Sovereign Em-
press and also bought her mother
Empress Rag Apple Della a six-
year-old cow at \$1075. The daugh-
ter was the highest price bred heifer
sold.

Top female was the four-year-
old Lady No Plus Lochmava who
went to J. M. Fraser, Streetsville,
at \$1,100.
J. W. Greenwood Maple, paid
\$1,050 for Oriole Lodge Dale Syl-
via, a four-year-old daughter of
the former herd sire Montvic Rag
Apple Churchill.

Second highest price of the day
was \$2,000 bid by G. E. D.
Greene, Agincourt, for the two-

year-old bull Eglantiers Emperor
Supreme, he a son of Montvic Em-
peror Ajax twice Grand Champion
at Lachute Exhibition and classi-
fied "XXX" in Selective Registra-
tion.

Eleven bulls averaged \$883; 50
milking females \$588; 20 bred heif-
ers \$630; 13 open heifers \$420, and
11 calves \$443. Fourteen baby cal-
ves sold were included with their
dams in the general average.

The entire sale moved with dis-
patch, the entire offering of 119
head going through the ring in just
over five hours. In charge of the
herd was Geo. W. Henry while L.
E. Franklin, Brantford, acted as
sales manager and chief auctioneer.
He was assisted in the ring by C.
B. Smith, Williamstown, Mich. and
F. Roy Ormiston, Brooklin. Other
good prices included \$875 and \$850
paid for a pair of bred heifers by
Dr. Paul Beer, Georgetown, \$875
by A. M. Naylor, Weston for a six-
year-old cow; \$800 by Raymondale
Farm, Vaudreuil, Que. for a two-
year-old in milk; \$800 by Mrs. B.
M. Hallward, North Hatley,
Quebec, for a bred heifer; \$775
by Mr. H. C. McCloskey, Queens-
ville, for a three-year-old; \$775
by J. M. Fraser, Streetsville
for a two-year-old in milk; \$725
and \$725 by Walter Lemon, Odessa
for a bred heifer and a three-year-
old heifer; \$700 by J. J. E. Mc-
Cague, Alliston, for a bred heifer
and \$700 by M. & E. Dyer, Barrie,
for a four-year-old heifer.
