

### Renew Bus Contracts with **Present Drivers**

Tenders for high school bus routes in North Halton were returned unopened to four tenderers after a recent meeting of the school board in Georgetown.

Before the tenders were opened it was found that there was a clause in the present contract which gave the present operators the contract for another year.

A tender for supplying, coal to Georgetown school at \$17\_a ton .was.\_\_\_\_ awarded to W. H. Kentner & Son. A tender was also awarded to Milton District Co-Operative for supplying coal for Milton school. Roofing and eavestrough repairs, totalling \$450 will be made at Milton

school. Salary of the secretary-treasurer Lt.-Col. Gordon Brown was increased from \$750 to \$1,000 effective July 1st. The secretary reported that all vacancies were filled on the staffs of the three schools and contracts signed with the teachers for next term.

The board was notified that a hearing on the sharing of school costs as set by a board of arbitration, which Georgetown is disputing, has been postponed until September. The Municipal Board was originally scheduled to meet in Georgetown on June 22 to decide the mat-
