

**By-Law No. 16-51 • Legion Notes •**

**TOWNSHIP OF ESQUEWING**

A BY-LAW to raise \$40,000 to aid in the construction of tile, stone or timber drains.

The Council of the Township of Esquewings, pursuant to the Tile Drainage Act, enacts as follows:

1. That the Reeve may from time to time, subject to the provisions of this By-Law, borrow on the credit of the Corporation of the Municipality such sum not exceeding in the whole \$40,000.00, as may be determined by the Council, and may in manner hereinafter provided, issue debentures of the corporation in such sums as the Council may deem proper for the amount so borrowed, with coupons attached, as provided in section 4 of the said Act.

2. That, subject to section 10 of the Tile Drainage Act, when the Council is of the opinion that the application of any person to borrow money for the purpose of constructing a tile, stone or timber drain should be granted in whole or part, the Council may, by resolution, direct the Reeve to issue debentures as aforesaid and to borrow a sum not exceeding the amount applied for, and may lend the same to the applicant on the completion of the drainage works.

3. A special annual rate shall be imposed, levied and collected over and above all other rates upon the land in respect of which the money is borrowed, sufficient for the payment of the principal and interest as provided by the Act.

**Maple Unit Purchases Remco Texal Sovereign**

Members of the Halton Branch of the Maple Unit will be interested in the recent purchase of the Geo. S. Henry dispersal, of Remco Texal Sovereign. Holstein breeders will recall that Remco is a triple x bull which was reserve All-Canadian as a three year old and a former grand champion at many shows. He is a son of the noted Sovereign and his dam, Lonelm Texal Joan a "Very Good" cow which has many outstanding records to her credit. As a 3 year old in 365 days she produced 20,984 lbs. of milk with a 3.99 per cent test. The factor which played an important part in the purchase of Remco by the Maple Unit was the line-up of 35 daughters in the Henry herd. These offspring ranging in age from four months to junior three year olds brought an average of \$485 each at the same sale with a top of \$1100. We are informed by G. W. Keffer, manager

of the Maple Unit, that in the first six months of 1950, over 18,000 cows have been bred by the Maple Unit. A total of some 25,000 cows were bred during the previous twelve months which indicates the rapid growth of the unit and the popularity of the herd sires owned and in service.
