

By-Law No. 16-51

TOWNSHIP OF ESQUESING

BY-LAW to raise \$40,000 to aid in the construction of tile, stone or timber drains.

The Council of the Township of Esquensing, pursuant to the Tile Drainage Act, enacts as follows:

1. That the Reeve may from time to time, subject to the provisions of this By-Law, borrow on the credit of the Corporation of the Municipality such sum not exceeding in the whole \$40,000.00, as may be determined by the Council, and may in manner hereinafter provided, issue debentures of the Corporation in such sums as the Council may deem proper for the amount so borrowed, with coupons attached as provided in section 4 of the said Act.

2. That, subject to section 10 of the Tile Drainage Act, when the Council is of the opinion that the application of any person to borrow money for the purpose of constructing a tile, stone or timber drain should be granted in whole or part, the Council may, by resolution, direct the Reeve to issue debentures as aforesaid and to borrow a sum not exceeding the amount applied for, and may lend the same to the applicant on the completion of the drainage works.

3. A special annual rate shall be imposed, levied and collected over and above all other rates upon the land in respect of which the money is borrowed, sufficient for the payment of the principal and interest as provided by the Act.

FARM NEWS

Halton Breeders Visit Oshawa District

Forty-one Halton Holstein enthusiasts under the leadership of President A. G. Hunter, of the Halton Holstein Club, enjoyed a bus tour on Wednesday of last week. The first call was at Elmcroft Farms, near Oshawa. Here the party was received by the owner, George McLaughlin, and taken on a tour of his dairy barns and large Holstein herd. Following dinner at the Genesha Hotel, the group had a two-hour tour of the General Motors Plant in Oshawa. Here they saw cars and trucks in practically every stage of production. The efficiency in organization and management in this big plant has to be seen to be appreciated. The final stop on the way home was made at Leitchcroft Farms near Langstaff, where the general manager, Joseph Lanthier, gave them a first hand picture of barn hay driers in action and presented facts and figures on the cost of installation and operation. As we recall from memory, a five h.p. motor with the necessary fan, can be installed at present day prices for \$650.00. This, according to Mr. Lanthier, will handle a thirty ton mow or even two thirty ton mows. At Leitchcroft farms they apparently have had equally as poor haying weather as we have in Halton. Consequently their hay is not of the quality they have had in former years. The mow finishing of hay did enable them in 1950 to make hay analyzing 19% protein, against 14 or 15 per cent for field cured hay.

In short, according to all reports, everyone found the day's tour a most enjoyable and worthwhile outing.

Mrs. Hugh Summers Heads Institute Group

Elected President, Federated Women's Institute of Canada at F.W.I.C. Biennial Meeting St. Anne de Bellevue, Quebec, June 22, 1951

Mrs. Hugh Summers, R. R. 1, Fonthill, newly elected president of the Federated Women's Institute of Canada, has been an active member of the Decew Falls Women's Institutes for 20 years having held the position of Branch president, Welland District president and convener of Social Welfare.

In 1946 Mrs. Summers was made a Women's Institute life member in appreciation of her unselfish service. When you ask Mrs. Summers how she became interested in Institute work she will tell you that she was brought up in the Institute by her mother, Mrs. Gaiser of Welland.

Mrs. Summers, a teacher before her marriage lives on a dairy farm. She has one child and two grandchildren.

Her community activities bear witness to the fact that she is very deeply interested in community betterment. At the present time she is president of the Thorold and Thorold Township Board of the Victorian Order of Nurses and is a trustee of the Lincoln, Welland High School District Board.

In the fall of 1950 Mrs. Summers completed 10 years of active service on the Board of the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario having acted in the various capacities as board director, resolutions convener and served as provincial president from 1944-1947.

It was Mrs. Summers privilege to be provincial president at the time of the Fiftieth Anniversary Celebration at Guelph in 1947 (to which 12,000 women came) also to head the Ontario delegation at the triennial conference of the Associated Country Women of the World at Amsterdam in 1947. Much was accomplished in Women's Institute work during Mrs. Summers term of office. Ontario's membership in-

creased from 32,000 in 1944 to over 38,000 in 1947. Mrs. Summers had a great part to play in the publishing of the new Ontario Women's Institute Hand Book, in supervising the production of the film on Women's Institute Activities "Let There Be Light", in the publishing of the book "50 Years of Achievement" and in the establishment of scholarships for girls entering the degree course at Macdonald Institute.

From 1947 to the present Mrs. Summers has been active on the board of the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada. She brings to her new position a wealth of experience and the enthusiasm and sound thinking so necessary to wisely head up this splendid organization of some 85,000 rural women who have as their motto "For Home & Country."
