REPORT ON NEWCASTLE DISEASE

Dr. T. Childs, veterinary director general, today issued the following report on Newcastle disease in Canada for the week ending July 14th. Also included are totals of flocks destroyed and compensation paid since April 1st, 1951.

Five new cases were discovered in British Columbia and two flocks containing 3,047 birds and 50 eggs were destroyed. Compensation was \$3,947. Totals since April are 106 flocks found infected, compensation \$125,226. A total of more than 410,000 chickens and turkeys have been vaccinated in B.C.

Fourteen flocks comprising 2,512 birds and 384 eggs were destroyed in Alberta with total compensation of \$5,852.

Three flocks comprising 591 birds and 218 eggs were destroyed in Saskatchewan, where compensation was \$611. Sixty-six flocks have been destroyed to date since April with compensation of \$13,605.

In Manitoba, fourteen flocks were destroyed. These included 1,929 birds and 152 eggs. Compensation was \$1,832. A total of 107 flocks have been destroyed with \$23,161 compensation.

A 1,875 bird flock was destroyed in Ontario during the week with compensation of \$469. A total of 30 flocks have been destroyed in Ontario and compensation has amounted to \$31,765.

No cases have been discovered in the Maritimes or Quebec.

PLAN MEETING TO DISCUSS FIVE-DAY WEEK IN THE FALL

The subject of a five-day business week in Brampton has again gained momentum among the merchants of the town. Fresh impetus was given to the idea last Friday at a meeting of the Group Chairmen of the Retail Merchants' Division of the Brampton Chamber of Commerce.

A meeting is being planned for early this fall to be attended by all retail merchants in town to discuss fully and investigate whether or not a majority of the merchants desire a five-day business week. If the merchants are in favour of the plan it would probably come into effect the 1st of January.

A great many communities in Ontario now have the five-day shopping week in effect. A poll of the Brampton merchants showed a majority were definitely in favour of changing to the shorter shopping week. With the Wednesday half-day plan in danger of breaking down it is probable that Brampton will have a five day shopping week next year.
