## Native of Georgetown Harry Brooke Dies

The ashes of Harry Grover Brooke, a Georgetown native, were interred in the family plot in Greenwood Cemetery last Thursday.

Mr. Brooke died in Duluth, Minnesota on June 29th and was cremated at Lakewood, Minneapolis. He was a son of the late Frederick Brooke and was born in Georgetown 56 years ago. His father was once an extensive property owner in town and the Main Street Block which houses Bain's 5c to \$1.00 Store, B. F. Murrin Sheet Metal, Simmons Jewellers and the Golden Gate Cafe, it is still known as the Brooke Block. It is now owned by K. M. Langdon.

Mr. Brooke enlisted and served overseas in the first war with the Halton-Rifles. He had been employed for over 25 years with the William Wrigley Co. in the States.

He is survived by two brothers, and one sister, Dr. R. J. W. Brooke, Frank Brooke and Mrs. Robinette, all of Toronto.
