Mackenzie Gets New \$189,200 Public School

J. B. Mackenzie & Son have been awarded the contract for building the new Georgetown Public School. The contract price is \$189,200. The Mackenzie tender was chosen by the school board at a meeting last month.

Complete cost of the new building is estimated at \$220,000, with land figured at \$9750, architect fee \$12,000 and furnishings \$9050.

At last night's council meeting first and second reading was given to a by-law for the borrowing of \$230,000, which will go to the Municipal Board for approval. Originally a by-law was passed calling for expenditure of \$190,000, and the increased cost makes a new by-law necessary. \$10,000 has been allowed for possible discounts on debentures, printing and advertising and incidental costs. It is planned to have the debentures bear 4 1/2 per cent.

The Mackenzie firm has had considerable experience in school building. Besides constructing the 3-room Glen Williams School, they have just finished an addition to Westwood School at Oakville and are at present building the addition to Acton Public School.

What Council Did

ON TUESDAY, AUGUST 7th
Gave permission to Central Mortgage and Finance to put all local wartime houses up for sale in September, the town receiving \$200 for each house sold.

Sent a new by-law for approval to the Municipal Board for an expenditure of \$230,000 for the new public school.

Gave final reading to a bylaw for the issue of \$25,000 debentures for sewerage and waterworks extensions, which will go for approval to the Municipal Board. The expenditure will cover the water extension from Main Street to the industrial district and sewerage extensions on Arletta Street and into the Orr subdivision on Maple Avenue.

Granted \$50 to the fire brigade for convention expenses.

Gave permission to the Navy League to hold a tag day on September 29th. The Legion W.A. will conduct the tag day.

Will have new lighting standards erected on the highway from the cenotaph to Normandy Blvd. Hydro chairman E. W. Binkley addressed council, explaining that the hydro will pay the cost of the standards. Three hundred watt bulbs will be used in the new lighting which is much superior as can be seen by the experiment of those erected to date. It will cost the town \$270 yearly in extra hydro charges. The balance of the highway will probably be completed next year.

Turned over to solicitors Dale & Bennett for study a petition of merchants asking for a closing day on Mondays. Twenty-six of thirty eligible merchants had signed the petition. It does not affect drug-gists, fruit stores, shoe repair shops, pool rooms and services such as cleaners and plumbers. New legislation has been passed recently which provides that a town council may pass such a by-law.

FARM NEWS

CORNELL WHEAT TOPS IN CROP COMPETITION

In the fall of 1950 the Halton Crop Improvement Association laid down winter wheat variety tests on two Halton farms. One acre blocks of Dawson's Golden Chaff, Dawbul, and Cornell 595, were sown on each of the two farms. The results of the test on the Fred Dixon farm near Milton have just been released by secretary J. E. Whitlock of the Crop Improvement Association. Mr. Dixon combined and weighed up each variety separately. His findings were as follows:

Dawson's Golden Chaff, 1415 lbs.; Dawbul, 1520 lbs.; Cornell 595, 1770 lbs.

All three plots were each slightly under one acre in extent, and furthermore, there was also a slight difference in the sizes of the three plots. When these factors were taken into account the acreage yields for the three varieties were as follows:

Dawson's Golden Chaff, 27.9 bus.; Dawbul, 27.4 bus.; Cornell 595, 31.7 bus.

The second test was laid down on the farm of Fred Nurse near Ashgrove and yields of the three varieties will be released as soon as available.

MINOR DAMAGE AS TRUCK HITS HOUSE

Only minor damage was reported in an unusual accident last week on John Street. Bob Lane's ice truck was parked on the roadway in front of Arthur McGuigan's house, and when the brake became disengaged, the truck rolled over the sidewalk and struck the house.

Project No. 1 and Project No. 2 Wartime Houses go on sale on September 1st. This date, was decided by Council at the regular meeting on Tuesday evening.

Mr. Hardy, of Central Mortgage Corporation who administer Wartime Housing in Georgetown addressed the members of council and pointed out that Project No. 1 was due to go on sale on November 1st, and Project No. 2 on July 1st, 1952. The council felt that it would be advantageous to those wishing to purchase houses if both projects were offered at the same time, thus giving the prospective buyers a chance to purchase in either project. At the same time it would make the properties more saleable.

It was pointed out that tenants have the first opportunity of purchasing their own homes and if this is not convenient, due to size of house, they may switch to another house which may be on the market. Mr. Hardy assured council that tenants would not have to move indiscriminately, but if they did not feel in a position to purchase, would be asked to move to another wartime house, should their property become saleable.

Another reason for advancing the date of sale on these houses, is due to the fact that moving in the cold weather would not be desirable, and fall would be more convenient for all concerned.

The corporation receives \$200 per lot when houses are sold, and will receive full taxation from that time on.

Mr. Hardy could not give the selling price on the various size houses, but said he would contact Ottawa immediately in this regard. A down payment of 10 per cent is required with a balance spread over 20 to 25 years on monthly payments. Payments include principal, interest, insurance and taxes.
