THREE POLIO CASES REPORTED IN COUNTY

Since August 1st, three cases of poliomyelitis have been reported to Halton Health Unit. A 33-year old Oakville man, has the bulbar type with some weakness. A 21-year-old Toronto resident developed the disease while at a Trafalgar summer camp, but shows no paralysis, 'The last case is a 13-year-old boy, resident in Burlington, who had a mild

attack and has no paralysis: Dr. J. M. Mather, county M.O.H. warns that there is no use becoming panicky. Take such precautions as not using unsafe milk or water. Do not swim in polluted water. If there should be an outbreak, children should not attend parties, frequent swimming pools, movies or public places. Avoid undue fatigue. Control flies and protect food from

There is no reason to be alarmed, Dr. Mather. Use these precautions and if any illness devclops, consult your family physic-

ian at once. Workers in Australia and England have produced some evidence that there may be some relationship between recent immunization and paralysis in polio. In 1950 a study carried out in Ontario could not produce sufficient evidence to confirm or question these observations. It is unlikely that immunization is any more a factor than any other injections or operations.
