**FARM NEWS**

**CORNELL TOPS WHEAT TEST ON NURSE FARM**

In a previous issue we reported the results of a winter wheat variety test conducted on the farm of Fred Dixon, near Milton. It may be recalled that three varieties were used in the test, namely Dawson's Golden Chaff, Cornell 595, and Dawbul. It was pointed out by Mr. Nurse that perhaps due to the contour of the land there was a little more winter killing on the Dawbul and Dawson's plots than there was on the Cornell 595. Had it not been for this, Mr. Nurse is of the opinion that there would have been little or no difference between the Cornell and Dawbul.

total yields were as follows:  
Plot 1: Cornell 595, 1997 lbs.; Plot 2, Dawbul, 1927 lbs.; Plot 3, Dawson's Golden Chaff, 1643 lbs. Inasmuch as each plot was slightly under an acre in extent the yield has been brought to an acreage basis with the following results: Cornell 595, 39.7 bus.; Dawbul 38.3 bus.; Dawson's Golden Chaff, 32.7 bus.
