Church Hall Rented For Extra Classroom

Georgetown Public School, already crowded to capacity, will expand into St. John's Church auditorium, when school opens next week.

With the creation of another class this year, the schoolboard was faced with a decision of staggering classes or of securing a rom to be used until the new public school is built. A plan of staggering classes, with some children attending school from 8 to 12.30 and others from 1 to 5.30 was not feasible, in the board's opinion, because it would create hardship

on students and parents. Investigation of all possible extra classroom space finally narrowed down to the church hall and at last Wednesday's board meeting it was rented. The fee for rental will be \$200 a month for the ten months it is needed, and the church will supply heat. light and caretaking ser-

There will be three kindergarten classes this year, and all will be housed in the church hall. The present kindergarten room at the school will be temporarily converted

into Grade 1. Two new teachers join the school stall this year Mr. V. A. Stein, essistant principal, will probably teach Grade 5 Mrs. Harold Henry will teach half days as assistant kindergarten teacher.
