FAVOURITE RECIPES OF THE STARS

Like many young women her age, movie actress Elizabeth Taylor enjoys collecting things. Within recent months, the dazzling star of "Father's Little Dividend" has concentrated her efforts toward the enhancement of two collections — cashmere sweaters and unusual recipes.

Movie work, radio shows and personal appearance junkets do not permit Liz to spend much time in the kitchen of her apartment. So, the actress says she tries to satisfy her thirst for further knowledge of the culinary arts by collecting recipes. Recently a film fan sent the leading lady of "F.L.D." this recipe for pineapple-nut cookies. Here is how they are made. You'll need:

- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup butter or margarine
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs (well beaten)
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 4 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 cup chopped walnuts
- 1 cup crushed pineapple

Combine white and brown sugar, butter, salt, eggs and vanilla. Mix thoroughly. Now sift flour together with soda and baking powder. Add dry ingredients to egg-butter mixture. Drain crushed pineapple slightly. Then add pineapple and chopped walnuts to cookie dough. Drop cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for ten to twelve minutes.
