## Bell Telephone Seeks Further Rate Increase

Increases of 25 cents per month for two party residence telephone service in Georgetown and of 50 cents for residence individual lines are proposed in Bell Telephone's application for revised rates filed in Ottawa with the Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada, according to W. O. Misenor, the company's manager here.

The proposed increase for individual line business service is \$1.00 monthly and for two-party business service it is 75 cents monthly.

No change is proposed in long distance rates.

A head-on collision between a light English car and a heavy American model on a curve a mile east of Rockwood Saturday night killed one woman and injured her husband and three children. Three of the family of four in the other car were hurt.

Riding in the light car as it rounded a 90-degree curve on No. 7 highway were Mrs. Barbara Ware, 33, R. R. 5, Rockwood, who was instantly killed; her husband Harry, 39, scalp and face cuts; two sons, George, 6, broken arm and face cuts and James, 2 1/2, face cuts, and a daughter, Barbara, 9, fractured skull.

The Ware car was eastbound, when the collision occurred. The westbound car, a 1951 Buick, was driven by James McKinnon, 46, an employee of a Guelph garage. He received broken ribs. His wife was unhurt as was a son, James Henry, but two other children, Anne and Donald, suffered broken collar bones.

The accident victim was a sister of Miss Esther Taylor, who headed the polls in the Acton municipal elections this year.

Two fall fairs are in the public eye this week.

On Saturday, the ladies of St. Alban's Guild in Glen Williams present their fifth annual fair a small scale model of the older established Georgetown fair. The Glen fair concentrates on hall exhibits — ladies work, school exhibits, fruit and flowers, home baking, hobbies. Each year it has grown a little and aroused more interest among district people. It gets underway when a parade marches from Preston's Store at 1.30 to the lacrosse grounds. Decorated dolls, carriages, bicycles and tricycles, children in costume, the Girls Pipe Band are features of the parade. On the afternoon program are a baby show, old time fiddling contest, ball game, Friday night a western show brings the Kansas Farmer and his entertainers to the lacrosse grounds.

Plans have been finalized for Georgetown fair the next Saturday when C. D. Graham deputy minister of agriculture comes to town to open the show.
