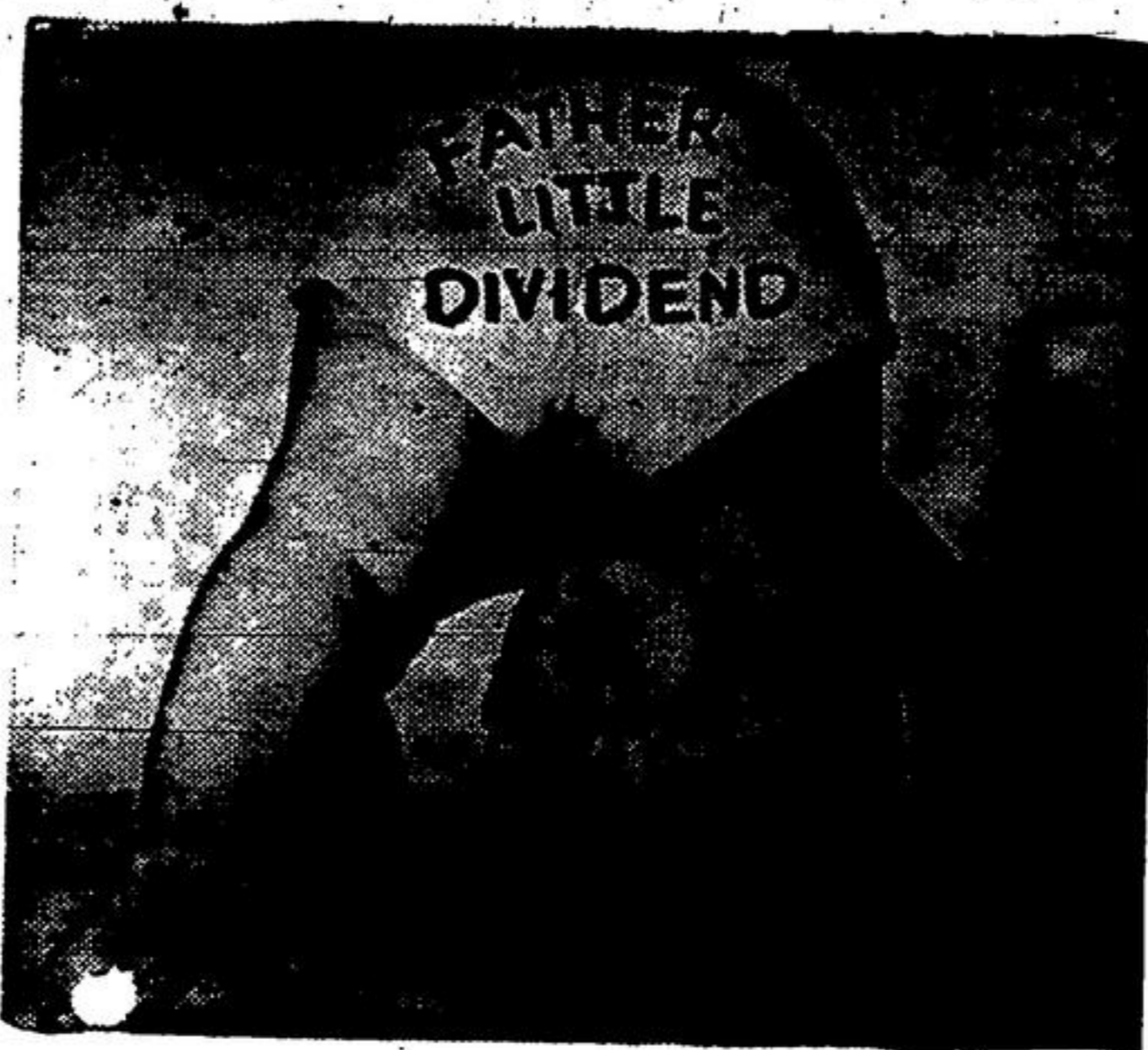
FARM NEWS

County Will Purchase 400 Acres Beaver Land

Halton County is fortunate in having as their county council a group of men who are alive to the need for conservation of water. That this is true, was indicated at the last session of Halton's Council.

by the discussion which followed the introduction of the question of the flooding of the Nassagaweya Township road as a result of the activities of the beaver released in the fall of 1949 on Concession 8 in Nassagaweya.

On a motion of Reeves George Currie and J. E. Ellenton, the county council recommended the purchase of the 400 acre block where the beaver are located and also approved of the idea of reimbursing the Twp. of Nassagaweya for any additional expense in the raising of the road in the vicinity of the beaver dam made necessary as a result of the beavers' activity in conserving water. County Council's action is in accord with a resolution passed some months ago by the Halton Conservation Committee, which pointed out that the conservation of water is of paramount importance to urban and rural dwellers alike in the County of Halton. If the area of 400 acres is acquired, as anticipated, it will be added to the properties now held for County Reforestation purposes.

Hunter Holstein Makes 830 Pounds of Fat

Spruce Top Mercedes Hartog, a purebred Holstein owned by F. O. Hunter, Norval, and bred by H. W. Richardson, Milton, has recently completed a Record of Performance test of 830 lbs. fat from 21452 lbs. milk. She was started on test as an eight year old and was milked twice daily for 365 days.

This animal has previous records as a seven year old of 874 lbs. fat from 16489 lbs. milk in 305 days and as a five year old of 720 lbs. fat from 19040 lbs. milk in 365 days.
