Comedians Lonzo and Oscar Stars of Grand Ole Opry in Brampton



Lonzo and Oscar, famed Grand Ole Opry comedy team, will appear in person at Brampton Arena on Thursday, Sept. 20.

Since the success of their hit version of "I'm My Own Grandpa", Lonzo and Oscar have had many top novelties including "Hole in the Bottom of the Sea", "If Texas Knew What Arkansas", "Onion, Onion", "I'll Go Chasin' Wimmen" (Capitol) and "My Dreams Turned Into a Nightmare", plus "Metro Polka", "I'm Moving on No. 2" and many others.

Both artists are accomplished musicians, Oscar, a Kentucky boy, started his musical career by playing drums in a band in the interim he studied piano, saxophone and mandolin. Since joining the Grand Ole Opry Oscar has concentrated on mandolin and is considered today

as top man on this instrument. Lonzo also hails from Kentucky and is master of guitar, bass and fiddle. He served with the U.S. navy during the last war and upon his discharge immediately returned to his first love, music. As a combination of Lonzo and Oscar are a "natural" in the comedy field. They work at hobbies as enthusiastically as they regard their professions. Oscar is an avid angler, spending all his leisure time at Kentucky Lake, with many trophies to prove his skill, while Lonzo disappears into the regions where he turns out beautiful wood carvings, furniture and novelties.

Both boys are married and make their home in Nashville, Tennessee. Lonzo boasting two fine boys and Oscar a little girl.

Halton Dominates C.N.E. Red Poll Cattle Show

Halton Red Poll breeders demonstrated very clearly last week at the strong Red Poll show at the C.N.E. that they do not have to take second place to any county when it comes to winning awards. This is very definitely indicated by the following awards:

Aged bull, 1st Geo. E. Coulson; 2nd George E. Readhead.

2 year old Bulls: 1st Leonard W. Coulson, on Minnesota Edgar which sire later went on to the senior and grand championship for males. In the same class Roy Coulter was 5th.

Yearling bulls: George E. Readhead, was first on Loading King, which bull later made Junior champion male. In second place in the same class was the entry of Leonard Coulson.

Bull calves — Here Leonard Coulson was again first, with A. Roy Coulter in second place.

In the female classes Leonard and Coulson was first and third on cows three years and over. His first prize winner, namely Rose Ruth Benson 4th went on to the senior and grand championship. The same exhibitor had the fifth prize two year old heifer; first and second prize senior yearlings; third prize junior yearling; sixth prize senior heifer calf; and fourth prize junior heifer calf. In addition he had the junior female champion heifer, and first prize breeders herd.

A. Roy Coulter had the first prize junior yearling; third prize junior heifer calf; and first prize progeny of dam. Another "Lowville" Geo. E. Readhead, in addition to his wins reported earlier, had the fourth prize senior heifer calf, and the first prize junior heifer calf.

In short, Messrs. Leonard Coulson, Geo. Coulson, Roy Coulter, and George Readhead, all from near Lowville in North Nelson, have pretty well demonstrated that Lowville is the centre of the Red Poll breed for Ontario — heartiest congratulations to them all.
