FARM NEWS

THINKS HESSIAN FLY DANGER IS OVER

In the Herald last week reference was made to a visit from Prof. H. W. Goble, Provincial Entomologist at the Ontario Agricultural College. Prof. Goble made a second inspection visit this past week to two of Halton's fields very badly infested with Hessian fly. Careful microscopic examination of the crop residues in these fields revealed practically no live larva present. To quote Prof. Goble in his brief report,
