Winston Wheeler Was Church, Sport Leader

Glen Williams is mourning one of its most prominent citizens this week. Winston Churchill Wheeler died in St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph on Friday after several months of failing health. He was 41 years of

"Win" as he was familiarly known in the Glen, was born in Glen Williams and received his schooling there and at Georgetown High School.-He was a keen sportsman and during his residence in Brampton where he was employed at the Dale Estate, he pitched for the Brampton hardball team. He returned to Glen Williams in 1939 when he took a position at the Alliance Paper Mills. His interest in sports continued and he was a member of the championship Glen fastball team in 1948. He was popular with the young people, always giving a helping hand to organize activities for them. He was a favourite chairman at the school Christmas concerts.

Church work took much of his time and at the time of his death he was superintendent of the Sunday School at the Glen United Church and chairman of the board of stewards. Ill health forced him to give up his position at the papermill last spring, and he had worked at the Dominion Seed House since then.

BELL PURCHASES RUSTON PROPERTY DIAL PHONES PROMISED IN 1953

Georgetown will have dial telephones in 1953.

Announcement is made this week by the Bell Telephone Company of the purchase of property on Main Street by the company. It is the old Ruston property on the corner of Main and James Streets, vacant since the death of Miss Jessie Ruston two years ago.

ted in 1953. Residents of Glen Williams will have an added benefit from the new service, for all telephones in that area will be converted to two-party or private line service. The company does not plan to convert these phones from rural lines now, with the dial project definitely underway, but will do so when the changeover to dials is made.
