Notice of a proposed By-law to close a part of Caroline Street, in the said Town of Georgetown, more particularly described as follows: ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises, situate, lying and being in the Town of Georgetown, in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario, being composed of part of Caroline Street according to Registered Plan Number 29 for the Town of Georgetown and which said parcel or tract of land and premises may be more particularly described as follows:

FARM NEWS

Clark Bros. Show At Markham, Rockton

Showing cattle for the first time in twelve years. Clark Brothers, of Norval, had good results at fall fairs at Brampton, Markham and Rockton.

In the Toronto District red and white show which was held in conjunction with Markham Fair, four first prizes included the best senior get-of-sire, best 2-year-old, best senior calf and best 2 year-old bull. Clark Brothers took seventeen head to the fair and in addition to these first prize winners, they had three 2nd, three 3rd, four 4ths and a few more. Among their achievements was the reserve grand champion bull and reserve junior female and second prize junior get-of-sire.

At Rockton, where first and second prizewinners were eligible to compete, Clark brothers were not successful in taking any first prizes but they scored one each in 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th, two each in 6th and 7th, and one 8th prize. Their Senior get-of-sire championship at Markham placed fourth at Rockton.

you prepare? We believe something simple and typically Canadian would be enjoyed more than elaborate fare. We can think of an attractive fruit salad with fresh blueberry muffins and a dessert of whole wheat waffles with maple syrup, lake trout fried in butter with a tossed green salad and a dessert of apple pie with old cheese, a colorful hot vegetable plate, rolls with lots of butter, and a delicious ice cream sundae for dessert. The beverage may be tea or coffee, but should be fresh and piping hot. Evidently the Royal Family have no preference since they have been rationed to a limited amount.

TEA

1. There are three kinds of tea. Black (leaves that are fermented and dried), Green (not fermented) and Oolong (from Formosa). 2. Orange Pekoe refers to the size of tea leaf. Pekoe indicates a larger leaf than orange pekoe. 3. Tea bags can be purchased in 1 or 2 cup packages which provide exact measurement. Bulk tea is a little less expensive.

4. Tea loses flavor if it is not kept airtight. One ounce should keep 150 to 200 cups. 5. To make a good cup of tea use a spotlessly clean teapot. Heat the teapot by filling with boiling water for a few minutes. Then pour out water and add measured tea, 1 teaspoon for each cup. Add freshly boiled water and let the tea steep 3 to 5 minutes. Strain tea into another heated pot or into cups.

COFFEE

1. Coffee is a blend of roasted beans. (These beans are grown in different countries.) Most people buy either drip or regular grind depend-

ing on their type of coffee maker. Use drip for vacuum makers and dipulators and regular for percolators and coffee jugs.

2. We can also buy dry coffee concentrate and frozen coffee concentrate, both of which have been favorably accepted. Use these mixtures according to the directions on the bottles.

3. A coffee maker should be thoroughly clean. Stains in the coffee pot can ruin the taste. 4. Use a measured quantity of freshly boiled water in the coffee maker. Use enough coffee for the desired strength. For medium strength use 2 "measuring" tablespoons for each cup of water. Let it "perk" from 3 to 5 minutes—no longer. By the way, never let a cloth filter become dry and never wash it with soap—these are two reasons why coffee does not "go down." Coffee may also stay in the upper bowl if it has been brewed too long or if a small amount is being made in a large bowl.

BLUEBERRY MUFFINS

2 cups sifted flour  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 tsp baking powder  
1 tsp salt  
1/2 cup shortening  
1 egg  
1 cup milk  
1 cup fresh blueberries

Mix dry ingredients together. Add a mixture of the shortening, beaten egg and milk, stirring until the dry flour disappears. Fold in blueberries. Fill greased muffin pans two-thirds full. Bake in a preheated electric oven of 400 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes. Makes 12 medium muffins.
