JERSEYS: The twelfth annual Parish Show brought out 100 head, which constitutes the largest entry yet made by the Halton Jersey Club members.

The Senior and Grand Champion female was a former grand champion, Avonlea records Suzanna, for Featherstone Bros., while M. C. Beaty had the Reserve Senior and Reserve Grand on Lindale Basil's Star.

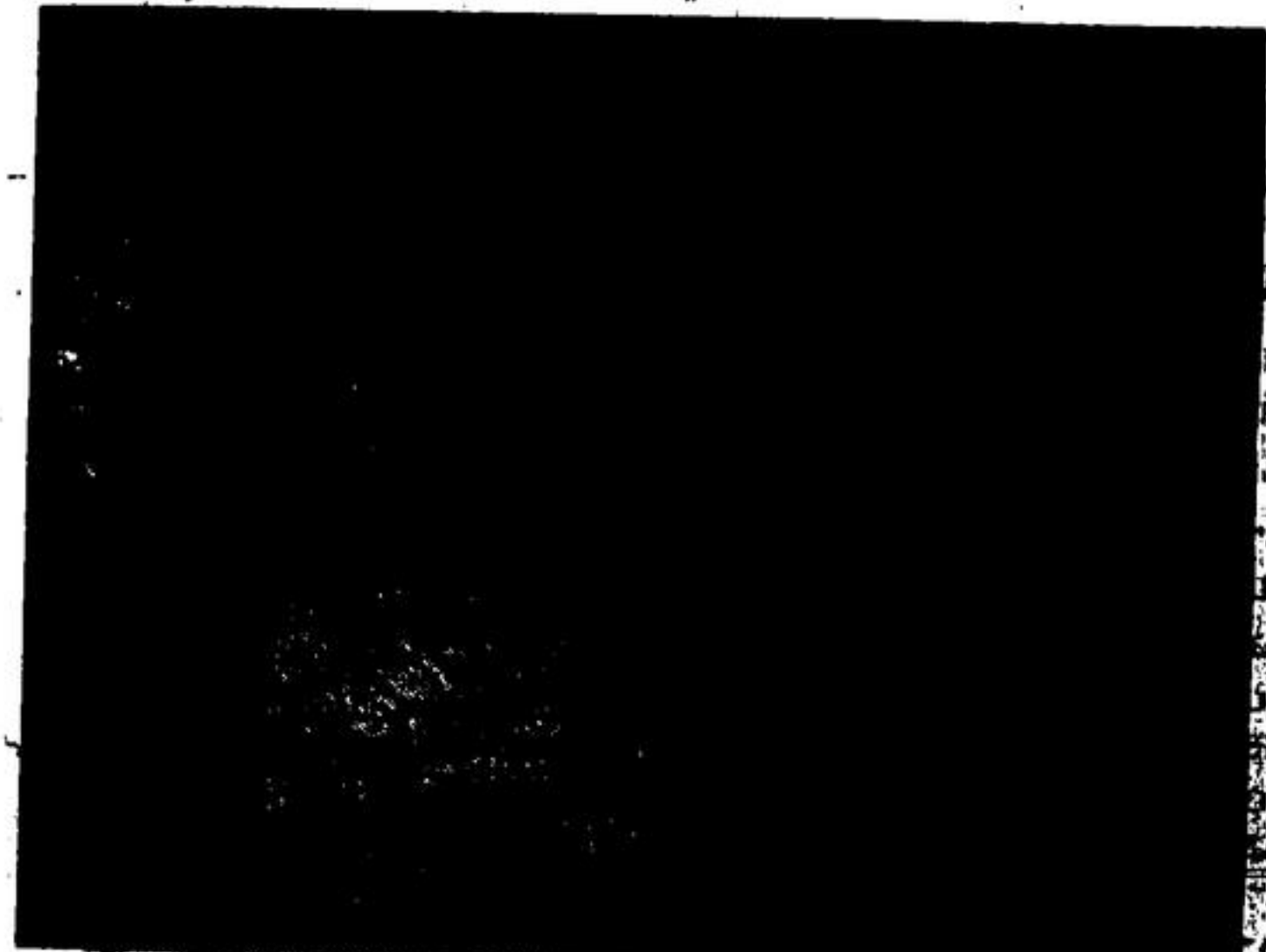
