RAIDERS WILL PLAY INT. B INTERESTING LEAGUE MOOTED

Georgetown Raiders will play Intermediate B hockey this year. While nothing definite in the way of a league has yet been arranged, there are some interesting possibilities. Elmira is most anxious to form a league from several eligible teams in western Ontario. At a meeting in Elmira last week, at which Bob Lane represented the Georgetown club, Mike Weichel of Elmira was appointed convener and interested clubs were asked to get in touch with him this week before the OHA is approached.

Represented at the Elmira meeting were Georgetown, Bridgeport, Walkerton, Hespeler, Milverton and Elmira. Invited, but not represented were Fergus, Orangeville and Milton.

The intention is to have an Intermediate B group composed of towns which have artificial ice. In the past Georgetown has had contact with clubs from most of these centres. Last year the Raiders played a couple of exhibition games with Bridgeport, a rough and tough outfit who always play a peppy game. They met Walkerton in an exhibition game at Wingham. Three years ago, Milverton met Georgetown in the playoffs. Milton were group champs last year and provided some of the best games of the season here. In past years, Fergus, Orangeville and Elmira were grouped in the Georgetown loop and plenty of fans look back on these as the "good old days" when carloads of fans followed the team from town to town during the season.

There have been a few changes in executive on the local club this year. Will Hillis replacing Frank Murfin as vice-president, Bob Lane continuing on as president. Jim Alcorn retains his job as treasurer and Jack Gunning will be club secretary. Ray Whitmee is in charge of transportation and A. M. Baxter has taken on the job of publicity man. There are strong rumours that Jack Armstrong, club president of a few years back will manage the team. No date has been set for ice making at the arena yet, but the ice will be put in as soon as it is needed.

The Ottawa Civic Hospital opened in December, 1946, with a capacity of six hundred beds and has been described as an outstanding example of municipal modernity.
