Royal Couple are Seen By Many from Georgetown

Sybil Bennett Flies to Ottawa for Carpet Ceremony Rev. Ross Cameron, Wife Presented at Army Party.

Countless numbers of Georgetown people saw Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh during their tour in the district.

On Friday when the royal plane landed at Malton, there were many from here who went. On Saturday in Toronto, not only were there dozens of citizens who motored to the city, but Georgetown people were prominent members of the welcoming party.

The Lorne Scots Regiment, with pipe and brass bands, played on Bloor Street in the morning, then took over the same duties near Maple Leaf Gardens in the afternoon. The brass band provided a pleasant end to the day for the folks at home when they marched down Brampton and Georgetown main streets on returning home.

Night school classes for new Canadians have been started in Milton and Acton. North Halton High School District board is sponsoring the classes and if there is enough demand from the new Canadian in the Georgetown district, there is a possibility of forming a similar class here. The classes are held in the high schools, at Milton on Monday and at Acton on Wednesday.

The board, at its meeting Monday in Acton, granted use of the Milton school again this year for community night school classes which the federation of agriculture sponsors. There was a large enrolment last winter and even more interest is expected this year.

School Board Provides Night English Classes

A request from Thomas Bradley, Milton attendance officer, for a salary increase was deferred until the next meeting. Principal Robbins of Acton informed the Board that the commencement exercises at the school will be held on November 15 and 16.

Another busload of high school students, including the girls of the cadet corps were taken to Toronto by the school board to watch proceedings at exhibition park.

No one was fortunate enough to be presented to royalty at the numerous functions, no one who is resident in Georgetown, that is. However, a former Georgetown man, Captain Ross Cameron, who is padre of the 48th Highlanders was, with his wife, presented at a mess party in University Armouries. Guests at the State Dinner at the Royal York included Dr. and Mrs. Charles Best, who are Georgetowners by adoption, having their summer home near the golf course.

Another former resident, Vic Smith who left his position here with the OPP to join the mounties, had the good fortune to be chosen as guard at the ceremony in Ottawa when Queen Mary's carpet was presented to the National Gallery of Canada by the princess. In a front page picture in the Globe and Mail, Constable Smith is shown proudly standing by the carpet, brushing shoulders with the duke who is chatting with Rt. Hon Vincent Massey, chairman of the gallery's Board of Trustees.

A Georgetowner who had the best view of the royal couple was Miss Sybil Bennett, K.C., who flew to Ottawa the day of the carpet ceremony. Miss Bennett saw them no less than six times, and was close enough to form some impressions.

"I thought the princess reserved and somewhat shy," Miss Bennett told the Herald "and was impressed with her graciousness and lack of pride and haughtiness. She is a wholesome young girl, smaller than I would have thought, beautiful skin and lovely eyes, and a voice just like her mother's."

Talking with members of parliament, Miss Bennett said they were all agreed that Princess Elizabeth has developed into a fine woman, one whom history will revere and respect and who will bring dignity to her part in the affairs of empire. The Prince Consort she describes
