DEHAVILLAND OFFICIAL SAYS NO PRODUCTION PLANNED

DeHavilland Aircraft of Canada. Ltd. has leased considerable space from Wm. B. Ackerman, Ltd. in the old "lower paper mill". It will be used as storage space by the Toronto aircraft firm.

Rumours that the company plans to do some production here are not correct. A company official, interviewed by the Herald, said the building would be used only as a surplus warehouse for heavy stores such as engines and large parts. There will be no manufacturing of any description.

The total staft will not exceed a dozen or so. At present some fourteen men are working under the direction of Syd Ambrose, a Torcnto man who is stockkeeper at the building. Parts will be trucked to and from the Toronto factory as they are required.

New Water Tank Being Developed

Hot water storage tanks, constructed of reinforced plastic will soon be manufactured in Georgetown.

The new tank has been developed by Leonard Bell, owner of Georgetown Clay Products and Kippen-Ker boat company. They will be manufactured by a company, H.M.S. Associates, headed by a Toronto man, E. C. Snider, in the same factory on John Street, where Mr. Bell has his boat works.

There is a shortage of hot water tanks on the market today, and the new company expects to have no trouble in marketing the product. Partial production may, get underway later this week, though it may be some time before production kinks are ironed out. Mr. Snider has his own staff working in the building and expects to be hiring more help as time goes on.
