**Beautician Studies at  
Famous New York Salon**

Mr. Bruno Scisizzi, proprietor of Lillie's Beauty Salon, was a member of the group of 34 Canadian hairdressers who flew to New York from Malton airport in Toronto on October 7th, staging a spectacular hairstyling contest in the air. The aim of the contest was to create a new coiffure for Princess Elizabeth in commemoration of her visit to Canada on the same day, and the competing hair designs were judged on the basis of their suitability for the personality of the princess.

The group of hairdressers was organized by Mr. Wally Robinson of the Beauticians Supply Company in Kitchener, and were enroute to study advanced hair design at the Robert Fiance Hair Design Institute. Because of bumpy flying weather, the contest, begun in the airplane, was completed at the Trans Canada Airliner Terminal at LaGuardia Airport in New York, where the competing hair stylists whipped out combs, brushes, and hair lacquer to put the finishing touches on their model entrants before the judging began. The judges were the non-participating passengers aboard the airplane.

Winner of the contest was Mr. Sheldon Anderson, proprietor of a beauty salon in Kitchener. He created the coiffure on his wife, Ann, who was his model. He received an award of a week's tuition at the Robert Fiance Hair Design Institute in New York. Mr. Anderson was also the lucky winner of a pre-flight contest held by Mr. Robinson which awarded him the trip to New York with expenses paid.

The winning coiffure, titled "The Princess Elizabeth Coiffure," is a neat hair-do with waves flowing back from the forehead and with a border of soft curls. This design will be incorporated in the Robert Fiance Hair Design Institute curriculum as a standard hair style to be taught to stylists from all over the world who convene there to study advanced hair design.

The winner, Mr. Anderson is a cousin of a local woman, Mrs. Leslie Clark.

This colourful novel is set on one of the Caribbean islands. Thomas Midway the Governor, is anxious to improve island conditions but his exciting vivacious wife finds island life dull until her cousin Clive Roper arrives. This is a romantic story with plenty of unusual incidents and colour.

**THREE ENGLISHMEN**

by Gilbert Frankau  
Three young men are bound together by a lifelong friendship that began at Eton in the last years of the 19th century. Mr. Frankau traces their careers with revealing insight as one adopts the life of a professional soldier, a second that of a man of science while the third expands his father's stock broking business in the city of London.

There are some memorable scenes from the Boer War and later from the battles of the Old Contemptibles in 1914-18. The older readers will find many nostalgic memories of a way of life that was good while it lasted and younger readers may gain new understanding and respect for the old-fashioned principles of a generation that knew what it was doing.

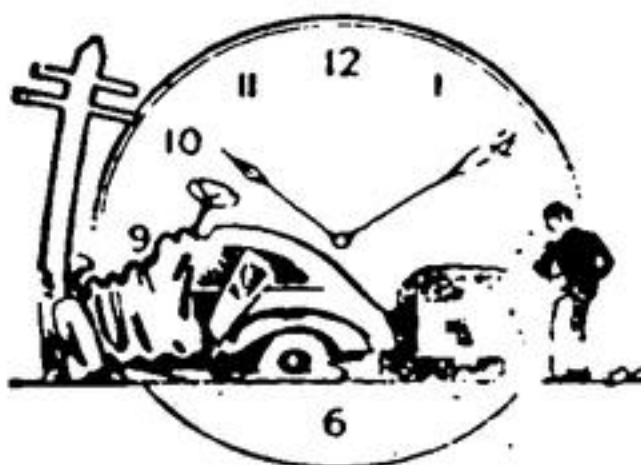
