Notice of a proposed By-law to close a part of Caroline Street, in the said Town of Georgetown, more particularly described as follows: ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises, situate, lying and being in the Town of Georgetown, in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario, being composed of part of Caroline Street according to Registered Plan Number 29 for the Town of Georgetown and which said parcel or tract of land and premises may be more particularly described as follows:

COMMENCING: at an iron pipe planted in the southeasterly limit of Caroline Street distant north forty-seven degrees forty six minutes (37° 46') east, Two Hundred and seventy four and eleven one-hundredths (274.11') feet from the westerly angle of Lot two (2) on the southeast side of Caroline Street according to Registered Plan Number 29, said iron pipe being in the production northerly of the westerly face of the main westerly wall of the Provincial Paper Mills Building situated on Lots four (4), five (5) and six (6) on the southeast side of Caroline Street according to said Plan Number 29;

THENCE: North fifteen degrees fifty-eight minutes (15 degs., 58') west along the said production, twenty-nine and ninety-five one hundredths (29.95') feet which is the true point of commencement;

THENCE: South fifteen degrees fifty-eight minutes (15 degs., 58') west along the said production, twenty-nine and ninety-five one hundredths (29.95') feet to a point on the southeasterly limit of Caroline Street distant Two Hundred and seventy-four and eleven one-hundredths (274.11') feet measured northeasterly from the westerly angle of the said Lot two (2).

**T.B. Association Gives \$1,000 to Hamilton San**

Halton County Tuberculosis and Health Association has donated \$1,000 to the Mountain Sanatorium at Hamilton. A cheque was given to Dr. H. T. Ewart, medical superintendent of the hospital when he addressed a meeting on October 15 at Hawthorne Lodge, Milton. The money will be used to endow a ward in the new Holbrook Pavilion.

Accommodating 750 patients, the Mountain San is the largest institution of its kind in the British Empire. At present there are 14 patients from Halton. Dr. Ewart stressed the fact that it would be impossible to carry on without the help of voluntary workers and urged the association to educate the public to this fact. Various educational programs are carried on at the San, with 13 teachers and 8 part-time teachers on the staff. It is possible to secure matriculation and university degrees as well as courses in journalism, leather work, household economics and salesmanship.

Dr. W. D. S. Jamieson of the tuberculosis division, Department of Health, also attended the meeting and gave details of the mass chest x-ray survey which will be conducted in Halton next year. Free x-rays will be given by a mobile unit in urban and rural areas. Though there are fewer deaths now from TB, just as many active cases are found of this infectious disease and more cases were discovered in 1950 than there were in 1948.

Final plans have been made for the Christmas Seal campaign which opens on November 19th. Funds from this campaign will be used for the mass survey for pre-employment x-rays, tuberculin testing of children and to purchase comforts for needy patients, from Halton County. Halton people will be urged to contribute to this worthy cause by purchasing Christmas seals.

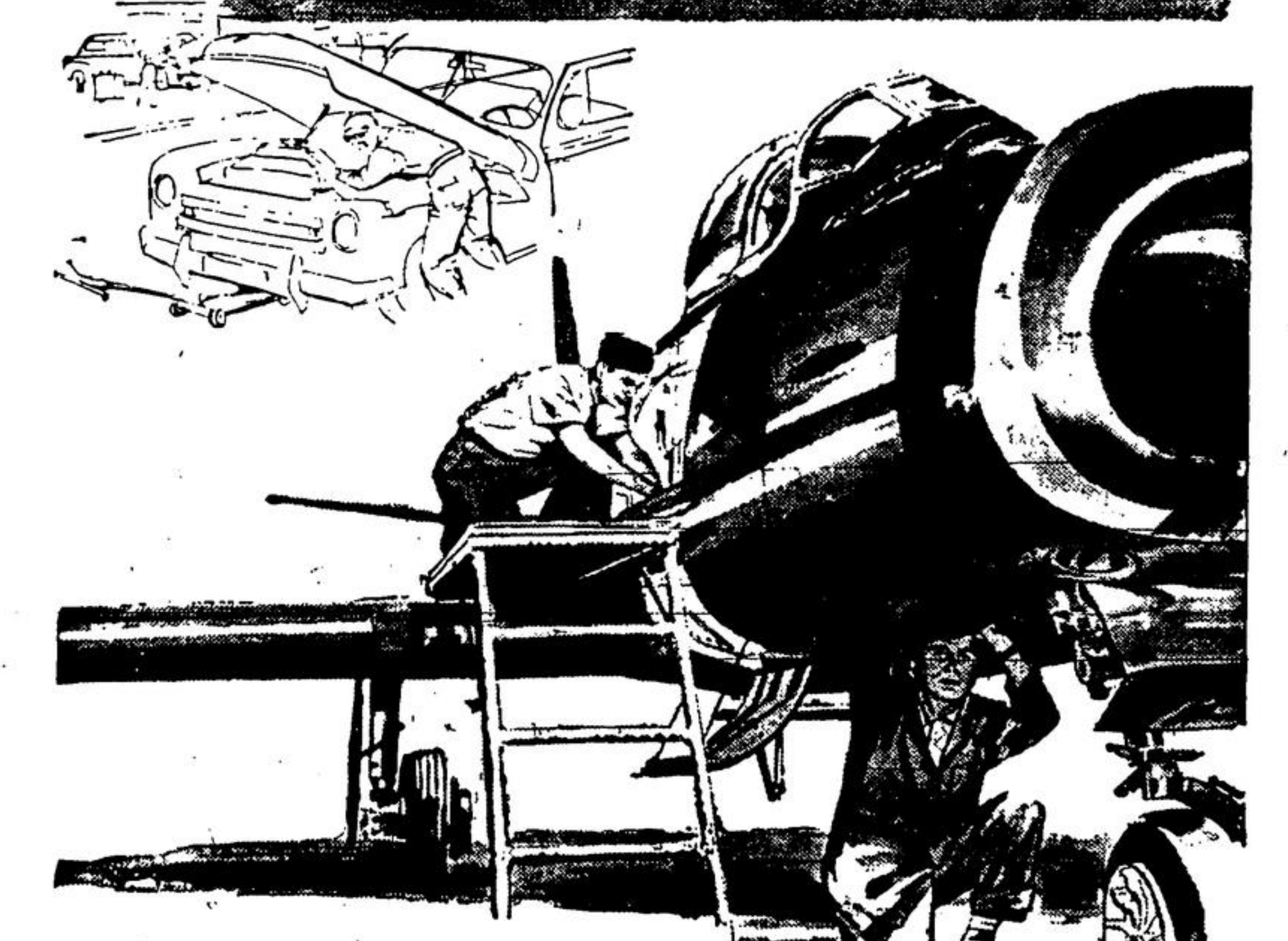
