WINNIE'S BACK

The British elections, with plenty of issues between the Socialists and Conservatives, took the spotlight from the Ontario election last week. It was a hot fight between the Attlee government and the old party still led by Winston Churchill, Britain's wartime leader, and whatever a Canadian's political stripe, there was a thrill to see Churchill back at the helm again.

The elections have shown that England is sharply divided on the type of government which its people desire. The industrial areas are socialist strongholds, while the rural ridings are predominantly Conservative, and England is roughly divided fifty-fifty at opposite ends of economic thinking.

ELECTIONS HERE TOO

There is no sign yet of any major issues on the Ontario political scene. So far the campaign of all three parties has been clean and there has been no personal mudslinging and a minimum of party skulduggery.

The Conservatives seem content to rest on their laurels of the last few years, with few promises of any new policies. Walter Thomson's Liberals have scared up a few party planks, including a hospital aid plan, which has been getting raked over the coals by some papers because it suggests that, although everyone will contribute in taxes, those in most need of medical aid will have hospital preference.

Locally the Conservatives are the only group that have shown signs of active local organization and publicity. Their campaign room is well posted with advertising material and the executive is planning some public meetings. However, we expect the other parties will be on the job soon, too.
