# ON MONDAY, NOVEMBER 50

Discussed passing a by-law cooing off a portion of Caroline Street for sale to Provincial Paper Ltd. for a contemplated expansion. A decision on passing the by-law was delayed for a future meeting and it is anticipated a special meeting will be called soon.

Objections to the road closing were voiced at the meeting by two property owners on the street, Fred Braisby and Sam Barclay. Mayor Cleave pointed out that if the mill expands it means more people in Georgetown and all property would consequently be more valuable. La Roy Dale, solicitor for the town said it was his understanding that the different owners had been approached by the company and had consented, but this was denied by the property owners present. Mr. Dale, reading from the statutes. said there was no question about council's right to close a street, providing it did not hinder access to anyone's property, however he felt the matter would be better ironed out between all parties and everyone be in agreement. Council adjourned for a trip to look at the property, and after considerable discussions and conferences between the different parties, it was decided to leave the matter for final decision until a special meeting.
