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## THOMSON PROMISES CONTRADICT FEDERAL RECORD: Stan Hall

Stan Hall, three times winner in the Provincial election in this county, was guest of honour at a social evening held in the former Murfin Block, Main Street, last Thursday evening. The evening was sponsored by the local Conservative Association and was believed to have been the best attended political gathering held during a provincial election in many years, by any political party.

The evening took the form of a social evening and euchre with well over a hundred playing euchre, while many more merely sat around and discussed the political campaign.

Prizes were won in the progressive euchre by: Ladies High, Mrs. Wm. Maybanks; Men's high, Harold Cleave; Gent's low, Joe Watson; Ladies low, Mrs. Jim Graham.

The president of the Georgetown Progressive Conservative Association, Les Clark, then thanked all those present for being on hand to welcome Stanley Hall, and hoped that they had enjoyed themselves. He spoke of Mr. Hall's fine record as Halton's representative, and said Halton could well be proud of the fair manner in which the member had represented all of his constituents, regardless of their political beliefs. Before introducing Mr. Hall, Mr. Clark said he thought the entire provincial campaign had been summed up by "Saturday Night", a Canadian national magazine, and usually pro-Liberal in their views, when the said magazine had printed a report of the Ontario political picture, extolling the present premier Leslie Frost, and his government, and referred to the campaign as the battle of Beauty (Mr. Frost) and the Beast.

Mr. Hall then thanked all those who were on hand to welcome him, and said he hoped that they had enjoyed the evening as much as he had. He said he was standing for reelection on his record of service to the people of Halton County and the record of many advances by the Frost government. He said that he sincerely believed more progress had been made in the last eight years by the Conservative governments of Ontario than any previous government. Mr. Hall said he was proud to be associated with a man of the integrity, honesty, sincerity, and humanitarian principles of the premier the Hon. Leslie M. Frost. He said Mr. Frost had served his country well in time of war and was now serving it well as premier of this great province of Ontario. Mr. Hall, along with the entire Conservative government, stood on their record of "Performance, not Promises." He pointed out the many contradictions made by the leader of the Liberal party where he now dashed madly about the province making wild promises, that were absolutely contradicted by his performance as a Liberal MP in Ottawa. Of the 102 standing votes in the House, he had only been present for 49, and during these had voted against among other things, old age pensions, controls to combat the high cost of living, both of which he now professes to be for. Walter Thomson had also yet to explain the terrific amount of money he had obtained from DVA. Mr. Hall said that he would not comment on this, but said he thought it significant that Mr. Thomson's federal leader, Mr. St. Laurent, had promised to table this matter for examination. Mr. Hall said he had had the pleasure of representing the county of Halton at the state dinner for the Princess and Duke...

Mr. Clark then introduced Miss Sybil Bennett, K.C., prominent local lawyer, and P.C. candidate in the last federal election, and president of the national ladies P.C. association. Miss Bennett told the gathering how happy she was to see so many out to encourage Mr. Hall, and said it figured well for his success at the polls. She spoke in glowing terms of the many fine qualities of the candidate, and told how Mr. Frost, in his rally at Oakville, had said that he and his cabinet needed the advice and help of such able men as Stan Hall. She spoke of the tremendous expansion of Ontario under the Conservative party, and predicted even greater things in the future. She said there seemed to be no reasonable doubt but that the present government would be returned, with a sweeping majority, but warned against apathy on the part of voters, and urged them all to get out and vote.

Refreshments closed the evening.

## EVEN INSURANCE MAN THINKS THOMSON PLAN NEEDED: Dr. Deans

The C.C.F. party, headed by E. B. Jolliffe, who has a summer home at Rockwood, was the official opposition in the provincial legislature for the last term.

Dr. F. Murray Deans, Liberal candidate in Halton told a meeting at Stewarttown last Wednesday that an Oakville insurance man recently had told him there was one thing above all others the province should take over — hospitalization for everyone.

"This insurance man told me," Dr. Deans declared, "there are so many loopholes and waivers involved he has practically stopped trying to sell sickness insurance. He said to me, 'You know, Doc, I hate to tell you this.'"

Humanitarian Plan Progressive Conservatives and the newspapers which support that party were trying to "knock holes" in the hospitalization plan advocated by Walter Thomson, Liberal leader, the candidate said.

But when you have an idea, a humanitarian plan, that reaches into every home in the province, it is a most difficult thing to attack successfully," said Mr. Deans.

"One of the first criticisms of the hospitalization plan was that it was unnecessary because plans like Blue Cross were available. Blue Cross is admirable. But it is not available. I am a member through a dental society. But I think there are many people in this riding to whom Blue Cross is not available.

"All the plans of which I know have a terminal point. The length of time you can stay in hospital is governed by the length of time you have subscribed to the plan — so many days or weeks.

Points to Limitation

"Our adversaries," Dr. Deans continued, "say you can take out a commercial plan. You can take out an insurance policy. But I think of my own case. I was laid up with neuritis for 10 weeks. The insurance company paid the full amount due me while I was incapacitated. However, when I got the policy back for renewal, there was a waiver, — a loophole. I could never again collect anything in connection with neuritis. If you once collect for something, you won't collect for it again."

The Thomson hospital plan, the candidate declared, was no term scheme. There would be no loophole, waivers or gimmicks.

"There will be no age limit! You will be cared for in hospital for a long as you require hospital care. That alone is almost worthy of a Liberal government being elected November 22nd," he said.

Pledges, Not Promises

Progressive Conservative adversaries, he declared, accused the Liberals of making promises.

"I assure you," Dr. Deans stated, "that we are not making promises. We are making pledges. I have said before, and I say it again, I would not sit with a government that failed to augment its election promises."

Supporting Dr. Deans at the rally was John Brown MPP, Liberal party financial critic who is seeking reelection in Waterloo North.

He criticized the government for calling four elections in a period when only two were needed. The present election, he said, will cost two and a half million dollars, a terrific price to pay when there seemed to be no issue at stake. In spite of Conservative attempts to claim all credit for the new old age pensions, he asked his listeners to remember that pension to people 70 and over were conceived by the Liberal government at Ottawa and administered by the same government.
