NOVEMBER IS MONTH OF THE BIG SNOW

This November will be remembered as the month of the big snow. The beautiful hues of autumn had no sooner disappeared when it came down as much as to say "you have put on your show, now I will put on mine" and what a show! Many hunters were trapped in their cabins and many more were trapped on islands and had to stay there until the weather moderated and melted the ice which was thick enough to stop a boat but not thick enough to walk on. A mailman in the Hunstville district said it was the first time in 22 years that he was unable to deliver the mail. One farmer alone made over \$100 pulling cars with his horses. When the final figures are let out regarding the deer shoot it will be expected to be far below last season's shoot when about 1 out of 3 hunters got their deer.

Deer Season Cancelled

Deer hunting season in Southern Ontario has been cancelled. The official word was received a few days ago.

NEWS RELEASE

"Moose must be getting real scientific," opines Byron W. Smith, Ontario Dept. of Lands and Forests chief ranger, and bases his theory on an occurrence at his station at Sand Lake Ontario on the night of the first fall of snow which had covered the ground to a depth of four inches.

First indication of a nocturnal visitor was observed when Byron went out in the early morning to read the weather instruments, and saw moose tracks by the rain gauge, in the front yard.

Further investigation revealed that the tracks led from the Algoma Central right-of-way along which the moose had been travelling in a northerly direction, to the yard of the chief ranger station. There, the animal apparently stopped at the rain gauge, and continued across the platform to the instrument box which contains the hydrometer for measuring humidity, a barometer and a thermometer. From this point the tracks led back to Algoma Central right-of-way and continued north.

Chief ranger Smith solemnly suggests that "when a moose starts worrying about weather at this time of the year, to the extent of checking up on it from the weather instruments, watch out for a long, cold, hard winter with deep snow. It's a sure sign."

Two weeks ago some nice ones were caught at Thornbury while it was snowing. If the rivers remain fairly low and clear for this week-end they should be hitting The season closes on November 30th. Whitefish are hitting minnows at Lake Simcoe. One should be able to take Lake Trout on spinning tackle near shore now. The season is open again now for lakerees at Simcoe.
