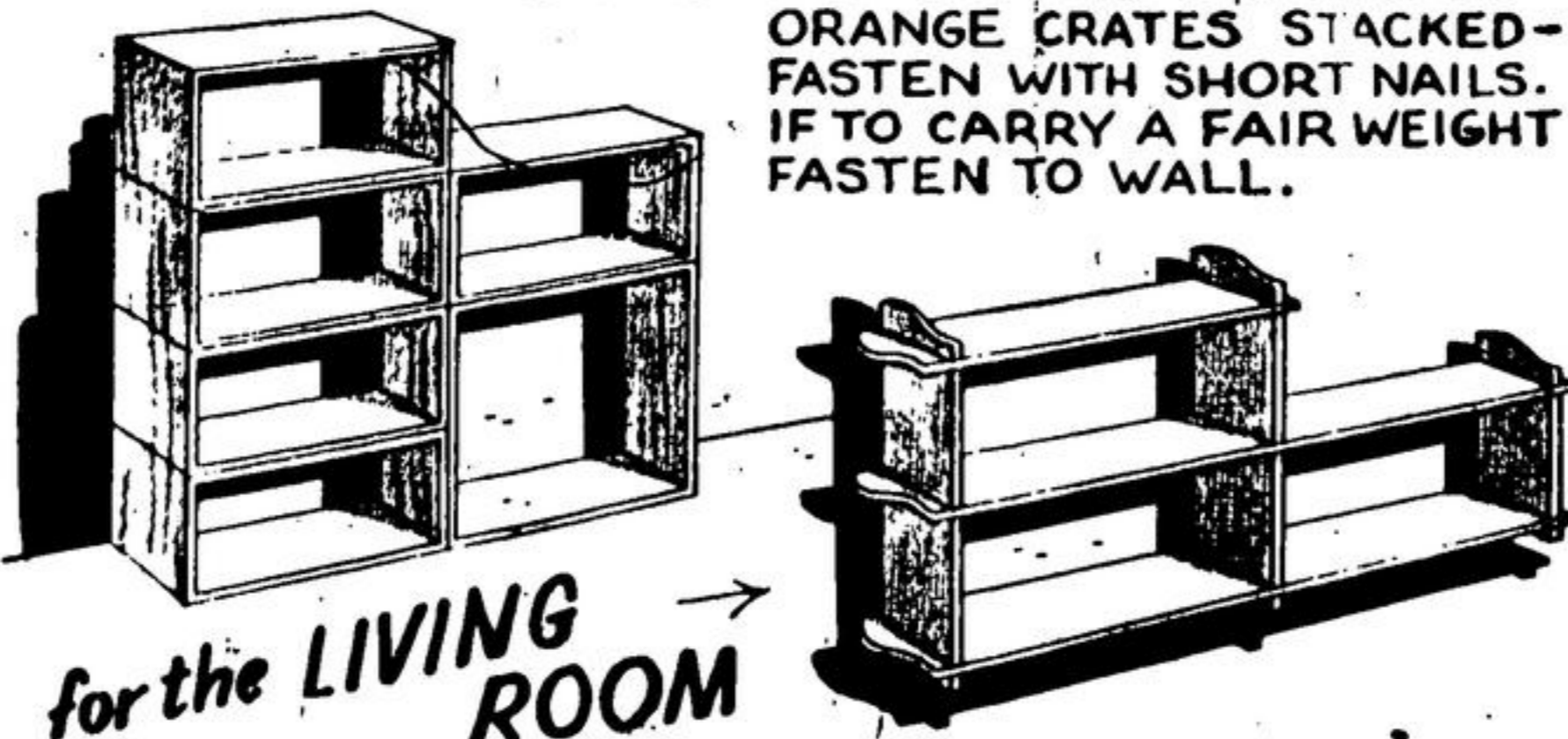
CLOTHES HAMPER

USE 1" PINE FASTENED WITH CLEATS NAIL DOWN BOTTLE TOPS, ROUGH EDGES UP, TO COVER BOARD COMPLETELY.



HOSE REEL

FRAMEWORK OF 1 1/2" SQUARE MATERIAL. REEL OF OLD BROOM HANDLES, THE CENTRAL ONE FASTENED TO THE UPRIGHTS WITH TWO BOLTS. SMALL WOODEN WHEELS, MADE WITH A KEYHOLE-SAW. AXLE A HALF-INCH ROD OF IRON.
