Conservative Sweep in Halton Hall Beats Combined Opposition

Returned for 4th Term With
577 Over-All Majority

With a resounding majority of 2770 over his Liberal opponent and an over-all majority of 577 over the votes tallied by Liberal and C.C.F. candidates combined, Stan Hall, Streetsville farmer rolled in on the Progressive-Conservative landslide in Thursday's Ontario elections. Mr. Hall will serve his fourth term as Halton's representative in the legislature.

Election results were a surprise, even to Mr. Hall's staunchest supporters who were predicting a close run. In the 1948 elections, Liberal Dr. Murray Deans, who was again his opponent, had come within a hundred votes of unseating Mr. Hall, and indications were that this time the voting would also be close. Instead of this he bettered the province-wide Conservative tally of 30% of the popular vote in the county.

Total vote for Mr. Hall was 9033 while Dr. Deans was supported by 6272 voters. Angus Langille, Oakville plumber making his first bid for office as CCF candidate shared the fate of that party by running third with 2183 votes.

The Conservatives led the polls in every municipality but Nassagaweya where the Liberals were given a slight edge. Burlington and Nelson were Conservative strongholds. It was a triumph for the winner that in Oakville, where both his opponents reside, he secured fifty per cent of the vote.

Conservative Sweep Sees 79 Members in Legislature

Returned to office with an overwhelming majority, Ontario's Progressive Conservative government will have 79 of the 90 seats in the new legislature.

The Liberals replace the CCF as the official opposition with 7 seats. The CCF have two seats and the other two seats are held by a Liberal-Labor member and a Labor-Progressive.

In the government are several members who have connections with the town and district. Peel member, Thomas L. Kennedy, who is minister of agriculture, again received a big majority. J. Fred Edwards, Palmerston druggist who once was a Georgetown resident, was returned in Perth as PC member. An uncle of Mrs. John Glynn, Limehouse, Alexander Mackenzie, is again PC member for York North.

Two relatives of local people, both CCF members in the last legislature were defeated by Conservatives. They are Robert Thornberry, a brother of Mrs. John Hepburn, Glen Williams, who lost in Hamilton Centre, and T. S. Isley, a nephew of John Isley, defeated in Waterloo South.

W. E. Hamilton carried the poll again for the PCs in Wellington South and John Root defeated the Liberal member Ross McEwing in Wellington North.
