Mrs. Anne Greig Dies in Toronto

A resident of Georgetown from 1925 until her return to Toronto in 1948, Mrs. W. J. Greig died on Saturday in the city. She was 87! years of age.

The former Anne Isabella Burns, Mrs. Greig was born in Toronto in 1864, a daughter of John Burns and Margaret Dow. The Burns family had early connections with this district, originally settling at Rockwood when they first emigrated from the Old Country. An uncle Rev. B. Alexander was once a minister at Norval and Union Presbyterian Churches.

Her husband, Dr. William John Greig died in 1921, and a few years later she moved, with her son Alex. to Georgetown where they lived on the lovely Wildwood property on the highway at the edge of town. As a member of Knox Presbyterian Church, she was active in the ladies' groups at the church and was a supporter of the local branch of the Grenfell Mission. During the war she devoted much of her time to knitting for the Red Cross.

She is survived by her son, Alex, a brother John Burns, Vancouver, B.C., and sister, Helena, Mrs. H. K. McIntosh, of Victoria, B.C.

The funeral service was held yesterday at Bates & Maddocks Funeral Home, Toronto, and interment was in Mount Pleasant Ceme-


