Tax Rate Low

Speaking of his year of stewardship as Georgetown's chief magistrate Mayor Cleave said the town is in a very healthy financial state. "While we have the lowest mill rate in many years" said Mayor Cleave "I must point out that this is because of the new assessment. The tax rate, like everything else, is hard to keep down and keeps climbing."

He pointed out, however, that comparatively Georgetown's rate of 43 mills is the same as Acton and lower than Milton's 46. Oakville's 58 and Brampton's 56.

More Housing Needed

There is a definite need for more housing in Georgetown, is the mayor's belief. No longer a small town he believes the population would be 4,000 if we had houses to accommodate all the people who work

He looks forward to 1952 as the best year yet. The coming of the Ford plant to Trafalgar, he said, will have a great effect on Georgetown in years to come and he can envisage the town growing to 5,000 and still growing.

He warned, however, that a growing town means a lot of expense when it is expanding. Roads, .water, sewers, and sidewalks all are expensive but they pay dividends in the end.

New Property Owners

It was a unique occasion, he said, to welcome seventy new property owners to a nomination meeting. The fact that every resident in a warime house bought their property spoke well for the town, and the edministrator, Mr Harding had said that this was the only town he knew of where this had happened

Council, he said, had made a good move in selling bonds for the new school a month ago at 98, for the bond market has fallen to 95 or 96 since that time.

Announcing he was in the field for another term, Mayor Cleave said it had been a pleasant year on the council and he had enjoyed the cooperation, not only of councillors and town employees, but had had excellent cooperation from industry, with Smith & Stone donating land for a new street and Alliance Paper clearing up the mill waste situation along Papermill Road.

Water Improvements Reeve Marshall, elected for another term by acclamation, detailed some of the waterworks improvemens which had been made under his chairmanship.

Proud of Surplus

Cr. McGilvray, one of five councillors seeking reelection, spoke as finance chairman and said he was proud to report an estimated surplus of \$5900, and as the mayor had already said. es low a tax rate as any neighbouring town.

He predicted, however that ratepayers can expect a two or three mill decrease next year, with the surplus plus revenue from sale of wartime houses more than offsetting

any increased expenses. Cr. McGilvray does not favour lowering the rate too much, for there is a lot of road work and sidewalks needed, and education costs will be increasing too. Public School costs this year, he said, had increased \$7100, but we have to have schools and there is not much that can be

done about it. He pointed out the need of a new town truck and a grader, and thanked the Parks and Cemetery boards for accepting half a mill grant rather than the mill to which they are entitled by by-law.

Discusses Sewerage, Garbage Cr. Harry Hale, whose public works chairmanship covers sewerage and garbage, said he favours putting sewerage into all the new surveys next year. Sixteen new lat-


