WHITE GIFT SERVICE ON SUNDAY MORNING

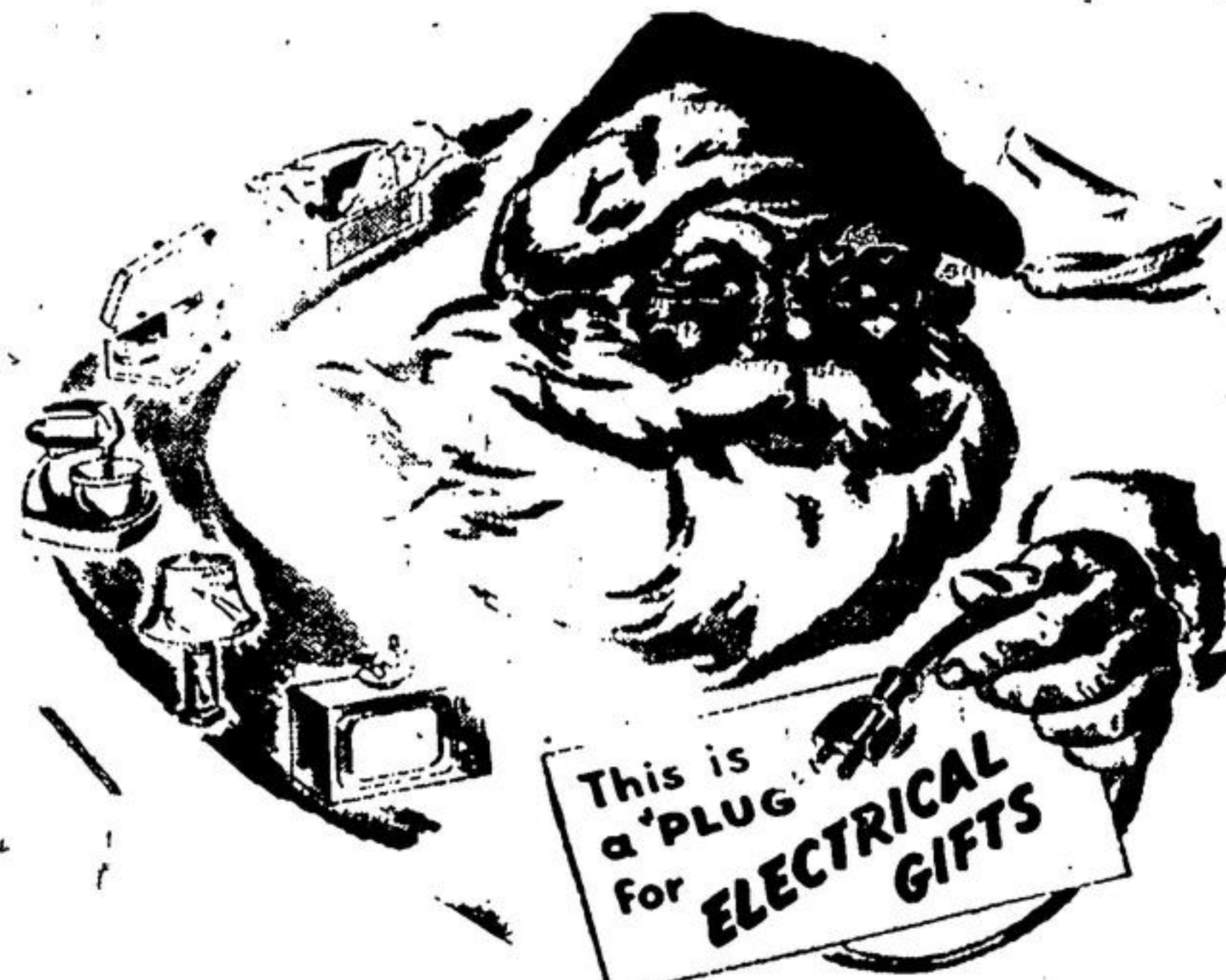
