

Farm Magazine Editor Speaks at Forum Rally

Monday November 19 found Halton Farm Forum members gathering at Stewarttown Hall for their annual Forum rally. Mr. Richard McLaughlin in his new roll as the chairman called the meeting to order. Roll Call of Forums revealed a gathering of 175 people. Numerous suggestions were given as recommendations for Forum organization improvement.

Miss Gillespie of the Halton Health Unit, acting as substitute for Dr. J. M. Mather, gave a very informative talk on the Tuberculosis x-ray clinics which are planned throughout Halton next year.

The secretary's statement showed 17 forums active and four delinquent. Mr. Joe McGillivray of the Milton Co-Op staff was duly appointed as vice-chairman of the county executive. An invitation was extended to hold the next rally at Brookville Hall.

Miss Vera May reported on the first Halton Folk school which was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. R. Coulter and gave in a concise manner the main points of each speaker's lectures.

Archie Service, vice president of the County Federation of Agriculture brought greetings from that or-

ganization and all commodity groups connected with it, and in doing so left three don'ts — Don't underestimate the value or importance of your discussion time; Don't underestimate the importance of your humblest neighbour; Don't underestimate the importance as an organization the opinion of your group.

Karl Parr, manager of Milton District Co-operative spoke of the pleasure he and his staff had enjoyed meeting with the different groups in their homes and mentioned briefly the outstanding qualifications of Co-op. The first being quality, the second service and then gave figures to emphasize the progress of the local Co-op business.

Mrs. J. E. Ellerby, vice president of Halton Women's Institute, substituting for Mrs. Milton Brown,

president, impressed the importance of all farm organizations working cooperatively together.

Dave Peletter, president of the Halton Juniors, brought greetings from this organization and impressed the audience with the fact that Ontario was the first province to have a Junior Farmers organization and still has the best. Speaking of the aims of this organization he told of the International exchange visits they sponsor with Junior Farmer groups of other countries in order to educate themselves to other countries' methods. He claimed they firmly believe in rural organization on a cooperative basis.

Mrs. Lawson played a piano solo after which G. H. Gray, fieldman for Ontario United Farmers Co-operative, introduced the guest speaker, Kingsley Brown, editor of Rural Co-operator. Mr. Brown showed a film "Up from the Earth" giving a true picture by sight and sound of the method of refining oils from the crude state to the uses of today. He followed this up with a thought-provoking address on the value of Cooperation, not only in the buying and selling of products, but in communities, homes, and in every day actions. True cooperation is an asset each and all of us can use daily, he said.

R. L. Davidson, voiced the appreciation of the Forums to all who had contributed to the success of the 951 rally. Lunch was served by S. S. No. 4, Esquimaux Forum assisted by North Trafalgar. A short recreation period followed with games and dancing led by Mrs. Ray Hergott.
