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Peel Liberal Candidate Killed In Motor Crash

Defeated Liberal candidate for Peel County in the provincial election 4 days earlier, Carl Flaman, 34, was tragically killed in a collision on No. 10 Highway a mile south of Brampton. He was driving from his Cooksville district home to complete business connected with his election campaign.
His auto went into a skid on wet pavement and swerved into the southbound lane directly into the path of a heavy truck. The truck, driven by Ivan Walters, Harriston, completely demolished the auto.
Flaman was thrown onto the highway. He died shortly after in Peel Memorial Hospital.
Mr. Flaman operated a 75-acre farm two miles north of Cooksville. He was also an accountant. He settled in Peel County three years ago and only recently resigned as general manager of an auto sales agency in Toronto. Born near Regina, he was a graduate of the University of Saskatchewan. He leaves his widow and four young children. He was a cousin of Fern Flaman, Maple Leaf hockey player.
