Christmas Seals Help Rehabilitate Bronte Man

Last August, Albert Knight, of Bronte, developed a dangerous lung condition, following an attack of influenza and pneumonia. He was taken to Hamilton Sanatorium and thanks to a new and highly effective method of treatment was able to be discharged after a short stay. During his brief period in hospital, Mr. Knight made good use of his time. He took advantage of the Sanatorium's training classes to study leather work, of which he already had some knowledge, and was able to greatly improve his technique.

Now, at his home on Chisholm St., Bronte, Mr. Knight is eager to begin capitalizing on his skill. Due to the powerful team of section A by his physical condition, he cannot rolling the excellent team score of undertake heavy work. The leather work, which he could carry on at home, would be an ideal occupation. He needs, however, the material and

the tools to get him started. Albert Knight is one of the many cases on behalf of whom the annual Christmas Seal campaign is conducted. Money raised in this manner makes possible the training of tuberculosis patients in sanatoria throughout the province, and their rehabilitation to useful occupations. Envelopes containing Christmas Seals have been mailed to householders throughout Halton County. Remittances for the Georgetown district are to be mailed to the Georgetown branch of the Bank of Commerce. All money raised in Halton is to be used for cases in this county. The campaign is conducted by the Halton County Tuberculosis and Health Association.

Part of the money raised by the seal campaign is used for chest xrays, an important factor in the prevention of tuberculosis. Some is spent in rehabilitating patients like Albert Knight, Supplied with the necessary leather and tools, Mr. Knight will soon be making billfolds and other leather products, and will be well on the road to supporting himself Contributions to the Christmas Seal campaign will help make possible the rehabilitation of Albert Knight and others who have been cured of tuberculosis and are anxious to become useful citizens again.
