Following the funeral service in Toronto on November 29th, interment was made in Glen Williams Cemetery here.

Hall's Majority 2762 Official Count Show

The official count in the provincial election, released this week by the Halton returning officer, W. G. McDowell, Georgetown, shows that Progressive-Conservative Stan Hall, who was returned to a fourth term of office, had a majority of 2762 over his closest opponent, and an over-all majority of 565 over both candidates.

Mr. Hall received 9063 votes. Liberal Dr. Murray Deans had 6301 and the CCF candidate Angus Langille was approved by 2197 voters. Official results are as follows:

NELSON VOTE CLOSE RETAIN THORPE REEVE

In a close run for office in Nelson Township, the present Reeve, George Thorpe, defeated Deputy Reeve C. L. S. Palmer by eight votes to retain his seat for another term.

Another member of the 1950 council, Russell Smales was defeated for the office of deputy reeve by councillor Fred Walker.

Both elections for top office were close. Mr. Thorpe had 802 and Mr. Palmer 804. For the deputy reeve-ship, the winner polled 898 and the loser 847. John Atkinson led the polls in his reelection as councillor. William Green and George Brenholz are the other two councillors elected. Defeated candidates were William Hume and John Gladwin.
