A copy of a resolution was forwarded to the Dept. of Planning & Development protesting the manner in which the vote was taken at Georgetown at a meeting on November 26th concerning the formation of a Credit Valley Authority.

Nomination date for the township elections was set for Monday, January 31st, when nominations will be received for reeve, deputy and councillors as well as school trustees for School Area No. 1.
