Warden Kenneth Dick Entertains at Dinner

As is customary in Halton, the warden entertained county council members and officials from different parts of Halton at dinner last Tuesday.

School, Church Worker Dies After Heart Attack

Robert Wellington Fox, who died suddenly after a heart attack on December 8th at his Milton home was one of the county town's most public spirited citizens.

For a number of years he was chairman of the public school board and was people's warden of Grace Anglican Church. He had lived in Milton since retiring from farming on the 5th line, Trafalgar in 1926. Before moving there he was superintendent of Omagh Sunday School and had served on Trafalgar township council.

A son of the late Major Thomas Fox of Oakville and Rosella Cottrell of Milton, he was born in 1876 in Trafalgar. He was married in 1900 to Mary Elizabeth Wilson, a sister of Mrs. Thomas J. Fisher of Georgetown.

Surviving are his wife and four children, Lillian, Mrs. D. Lerch, London, Ont., Mrs. J. Featherstone, Woodstock; Wilson, Toronto; Marion, Mrs. Bruce Berry, Toronto; and four sisters, Mrs. Stanley Beaty, London; Mrs. Keith Leriche, Omagh; Mrs. George Booth, Oakville; and Miss Frances Fox, Hamilton.

Rev. Homer Ferris, Rev. Griffin Thompson and Rev. Harold Beaty, Woodstock a nephew, conducted the funeral service in Grace Church. Pallbearers were a grandson, Harold Featherstone and nephews Douglas Leriche, Frank Wilson, William Booth, Lloyd Fisher and Guy Bussell. Interment was in St. Stephen's Church Cemetery, Hornby.
