In a recent issue of Abitibi. monthly magazine for employees of . 1917 and then went with the Ogilvie units of Abitibi Power and Paper Company, Limited. A Norval native. William Bird was the subject of a nice story at the time of his retirement from the company.

By permission of the editor of Abitibi, the story is reprinted below, as well as a picture of Mr. and Mrs. Bird which appeared with it. Mr. Bird has two brothers, Thom-Bird who moved to town from the farm this year and lives in the old Nixon house on Maple Avenue, and John Bird, Sr. of Stewarttown.

William Bird, steam plant superintendent, retired Oct. 1 after giving almost 25 years service to Manitoba Paper Company, but unfortunately four months short of the time required to qualify for membership in the Quarter Century Club.

Bill was born in Norval, Ont. September 6th, 1880, and received his early education there, later attending Guelph Agricultural College, where he became (interested in the art of making cheese. On leaving college he worked at this trade a couple of years, then migrated to Sault Ste. Marie where he spent the winter of 1898-1899 in the woods camps of Spanish River. In 1902 he landed back in Toronto with T. Eaton Company in their steam plant. In 1903 he met Miss Reta Peterson in Toronto and they were married the following year, but the course of true love did not exactly run smooth for just two weeks after their marriage T. Eaton Company sent Bill out to Winnipeg on the construction of a steam plant to operate their new store then in course of erection. In 1905 he returned to Toronto and brought Mrs. Bird to Winnipeg, first living on Hargrave Street in what was known as the Eaton Block, until they purchased their first small home in Elmwood, then a suburb of Winni-
