George Miller, who had lived in several communities around Georgetown, was buried in Glen Williams cemetery on December 17th. He died on the previous Friday in Erin.

Mr. Miller was born in Uxbridge 83 years ago and spent his boyhood there. A farmer and stonemason, he later lived in the United States, and at Terra Cotta, Norval, Brampton, Cooksville, London, Orangeville and Erin. He was a member of the Church of England.

His wife, Alice Harman, whom he married at Powassan, died in 1931. Five children survive, Daisy, Mrs. D. H. Overland, Erin; Lorne of Winnipeg; Alex, and Grant of Toronto; and Morris, Brampton. There are twenty grandchildren. Two children predeceased him, Maude in 1933 and Roy, who died in July, 1945.
