**WAS TORONTO MPP CITY COUNCILLOR**

One time member of the Ontario legislature and former alderman in Ward 6, Toronto, William Duckworth died last Wednesday at his home on Prince Edward Drive, South Kingsway following a two-day illness.



Mr. Duckworth, who was born in Fergus in 1881, first entered politics in 1931 when he was elected to Toronto city council as an alderman for Ward 6. He remained in council for four years and in 1934 was elected Progressive Conservative MPP for Dovercourt riding. He held this seat until 1948 and in 1950 made an unsuccessful attempt at a return to council.

Mr. Duckworth was a retired merchant, having started in business in Toronto in 1905. He was a past master of L.O.L. Excelsior Lodge, and a member of Olivet Baptist Church.

Twice married, his first wife, Annie Taylor was a sister of the late Mrs. Wellington Greensward of Georgetown. They frequently visited here and always made a point of attending Georgetown Fair each fall. After her death, Mr. Duckworth married Muriel Hutchinson who with a stepson Jarrett Hutchinson, survives.

The funeral service was held on Saturday in Olivet Baptist Church, with interment following in Prospect Cemetery.
