### Flashing Blue Lights On Highway Equipment

All Ontario Department of Highways snowplows and ice-control trucks used for salting and sanding are being equipped with two-way flashing blue lights which will throw powerful and piercing beams, front and rear, to warn motorists meeting or overtaking them on the highways of this province. These flashing beacons, restricted to the vehicles mentioned, will indicate mobile units that are wider than standard cars and trucks and that may have, under certain conditions, the deadly extra portion hidden by snow streamers from plows or smog from sand and chemicals. All snowplows and ice control vehicles move at speeds varying from slow to moderate. That permits swift braking in emergencies or stoppage due to running into banks or other major obstacles. The flashing blue lights also indicate vehicles that can and do lurch sidewise suddenly through hitting snow-hidden obstacles such as a block of ice, broken tree limb, or something that may have fallen from vehicle.

In deference to suggestions from the Chief Constables Association of Canada, the Ont. Dept. of Highways is installing two-way blue flashing lights on approximately 1,000 of its snowplows and ice-control trucks. The police chiefs feel that red danger signals should be restricted to emergency ambulances and fire-fighting vehicles. It is interesting to note that blue is one of the oldest of warning colours. In the Middle Ages, it was believed that, when a candle burned blue, "Sudden death" or other disasters threatened. It is worth recalling too, that the two way flashing signals on Ontario Department of Highways vehicles remind of the old Roman god, Janus, patron of doors, portals and new beginnings. It is hoped to have all the Department's 1,000 winter road maintenance vehicles so equipped by early in January, 1952, the month named for the two-faced deity.

Two thousand of the five and a half inch sealed beam driving unit blue lights have been ordered to equip 1,000 vehicles and smog-piercing flashing lights may be seen now in a number of Ontario Department of Highways' divisions. It is hoped that all motorists will recognize them instantly as warnings to reduce speed and drive with special caution and alertness while in vicinity of the vehicles.

### Minister's Father Designed City Schools

A resident of Toronto all his life, and an architect who designed many of the Toronto schools, James Harvey Seif, 67, died on Friday at his home, 299 Sumach Street. He was the father of Rev. Leonard Seif of Midland, former Presbyterian minister at Norval and Union and Georgetown's former recreational director.

Mr. Seif, whose father was a Methodist lay minister in Toronto, was superintendent of construction for the Toronto Board of Education for 32 years. During that time he planned 35 schools, and had just finished supervising the construction of Lord Dufferin public school when he retired.

A graduate of the School of Architecture at the University of Toronto, he was for a brief time supervisor with the Vancouver Board of Education. On returning to Toronto he worked with the City Hall before joining the school board.

Mr. Seif was a charter member and former president of the New Century Debating Club. He was a member of Harmony Lodge, AF&AM and a member of Queen City Orange Lodge. He was an active member and elder of Cooke's Presbyterian Church and assisted in the work of the Bible classes at St. John's Presbyterian Church. Two of his sons are ministers and a third will graduate next year.

Mr. Seif is survived by his widow, Adeline Caldwell Seif; four sons, Harvey and Stanley, Toronto, Rev. Leonard Seif, Midland, and Rev. Russell Seif, Jhansi, India, and a daughter, Grace, Toronto. Following the funeral service on Monday in St. John's Church, interment was made in Pine Hills Cemetery.
