Good Fox Hunting In the Township

The above hunters received a \$5 bounty for each fox shot. In this list there is a total of 42 foxes which means there was \$210.00 paid out recently by the township.

At present the hunters are rather handicapped by the deep snow so unless a thaw sets in it is going to be tough going unless one has a pair of snowshoes.

At the present time both cottontails and jackrabbits seem to be plentiful. The fox also seems to be around in fair numbers despite the fact that so many have been shot.

Ringneck Pheasants

I would like to say something about the pheasants this week. While out scouting around recently we found a lot of the wild food that pheasants feed on covered up with the deep snow. There was every indication that they have been having difficulties in obtaining enough food.

We made several feeding stations and placed a liberal amount of corn in each. If anyone knows where there is a flock please contact the writer and we will see they get some feed.

Apparently some people are still blaming the Township Council for closing the season on deer. The truth is that the Esqueping Township council sent a resolution in to the Department of Lands & Forests saying that they opposed the Department's plans for the deer hunt. In other words as far as they were concerned they would just as soon have had an open season on deer but not on the General Licence. As far as I am concerned it is a good thing the township council had the foresight to see what was going to happen.

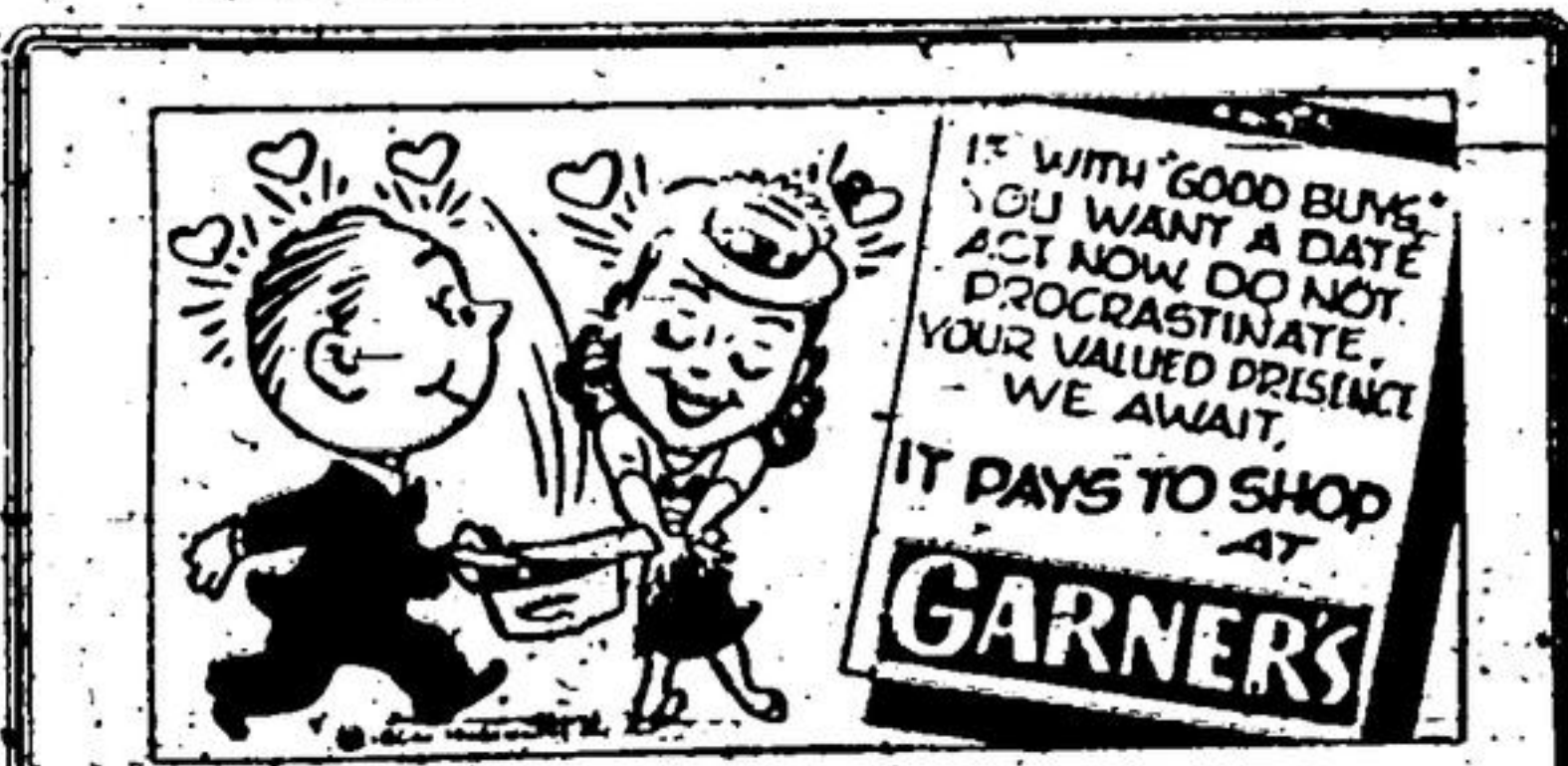
The ice should be getting fairly thick at Lake Simcoe. Here is the tackle you need for whitefish. I made it up last year and it worked good for McKey Porte and I. Take a piece of heavy wire about 10 or 12 inches long, make an eye on each end and one directly in the centre. The strands of 4 or 6 pound nylon about 13 or 14" long to these eyes. Pinch a large split shot on the centre of each strand; this helps to keep each strand separate from the other when lowering it to the bottom. Now tie a size 8 hook to the end of each strand. Put 2 or 3 of the salted minnows on each hook. Make sure the minnows are not too large because a whitefish has a small mouth.

For a line anything will do, just so long as it is strong. Be sure and place a large sinker on the bar directly in the centre so it will balance or place it on the line next the bar. This extra weight helps to take the tackle to the bottom quickly.

The next thing you need is a stick about 1 1/2" wide and about 14" long. This should be cut out at each end. This stick serves as something to wind your line on and also as a balance stick. It should have two nails in it one in each side. These two nails fit in the top of the upright stick that is nailed to the floor of the hut. The slightest strike at the bait on the bottom will make the stick bob. That's the time to lift the stick if the fish is on just keep pulling up hand over hand until the fish is at the hole then lift him gently into the hut. Just one more thing, don't forget to bait the hole before starting to fish. This should be done about twelve hours before starting to fish.

Fly Tying

For those who want to try their own hand at making feathered lures I would advise them to make some simple streamer patterns first. Here are 2 to start with: Hook size 3x long, No. 5. Body same as Royal Coachman. Tail, nose, hackle,

Hook size 3xL, No. 8. Body - pure white chenille. Ribbing - silver tinsel. Tail - yellow strands from saddle hackle. Hackle throat, brown hackle, not too long. Wing - Fox squirrel tied sparsely. This is also good in the spring.
