Cattle Buyer Delivers Holsteins to Mexico

Continuing his contacts with Mexican cattle ranchers, W. T. Craig Reid returned home on New Year's day after delivering his second shipment of purebred Holsteins to a buyer there.

Mr. Reid conceived the idea of selling Canadian produce in Mexico last year and after an initial good-will trip, in which he made many valuable contacts, he delivered his first order later in the year.

The cattle in the second shipment were bought by Luis Gutierrez Dosal, whose ranch is about thirty miles from Mexico City. They comprised forty-four 2-year-old purebred Holstein heifers, all purchased by Mr. Reid within an eighty-mile radius of Georgetown.

Travelling with the cattle and two Mexico attendants, Mr. Reid left Georgetown on a Thursday morning, arriving in Laredo, Texas the following Wednesday, and in Mexico City on Sunday afternoon. All went well on the trip and the cattle arrived in fine condition. On this trip Mr. Reid used the facilities of the freight caboose for sleeping. Most of his meals are taken at railway diners or nearby restaurants en route. At one stop, he missed his train and had to take a passenger train and catch up with the freight a few miles down the line.

The trip has lost some of the novelty since his initial trip, he admits and he was glad to get home again, travelling by plane to Laredo and thence homeward by passenger train.
